

# Air Attack Primed for Sentinels

## El Camino Grid Play Wrecks Riverside 33-12

Sparked by Paul Held's accurate passing and "Soko" Torres' running, Coach Amby Schindler's El Camino Warriors scored almost all the way to down Riverside 33-12 Saturday evening at Redondo's Seahawk Bowl.

The Alondra Park eleven counted 13 first downs and picked up 427 yards from scrimmage on both passes and runs. Paul Held, Al Huey and Don Davis completed 8 out of 12 aerials for 178 flying yards.

The Camino aggregation put across its opening touchdown midway in the first quarter when Held heaved a 24-yard pass to Torres. The try for the extra point failed and El Camino held a 6-0 quarter-time advantage.

Seconds into the second stanza, Held faded to his 48 and hit Don Jurk on the Tiger 30. Jurk raced the remaining distance to

pay dirt. The pass covered 52 yards. Held added the extra point on a quarterback sneak for a 13-0 halftime lead.

Early in the third quarter El Camino recovered an outside kick on the Tiger 29 to set up the touchdown. Torres clinaxed the drive scoring off tackle from seven yards out. Torres swept end for the extra point.

Minutes later Jim Sears cracked over from the Riverside 2 for another Warrior TD. The score climaxed a 30-yard march, the big gain a 19-yard jaunt by Sears to the Tiger six. Torres went over unmolested for the extra point.

Ron Dixon ended the Camino scoring when the ex-Redondo grid and track flash ambled 60 yards to pay dirt. Dixon picked up good downfield blocking and outraced three would-be tacklers to the promised land. Dixon's attempt for the extra point fell short.

Riverside's Jerry Lockwood saved the game from being a rout when he tossed touchdown passes for 34 and 9 yards, late in the final quarter.

## Newport Harbor Speed Scuttles Tartars, 34-0 in Non-loop Tilt

Our Tartars went to school with the Sailors from Newport Harbor last night.

While some 2000 partisan Newport Harbor rooters were finding plenty to root about, Torrance's grid hopes of 1949 tried vainly to solve the algebraic question of the evening:

If Newport Specimen A runs past Tartar Specimen B; and if Specimen A can run a lot faster than can B, how can B put the bee on A?

When the final gun had popped after 60 of the longest minutes in football, our Tartars hadn't found the right answer. The score: Newport Harbor 34, Torrance 0.

Torrance didn't have to wait long to learn what the question would be. Seven plays after the kickoff, which Newport took at its own 31 yard line, Fullback Bob Berry bolted into the prom-

ised land from three yards out. The Sailors from Newport Harbor had weighed anchor.

Before the quarter ended the Jet-powered Sailors rang up 21 points. By then, the Tartars, bewildered by the loss of their Tullback, Joe Clevenger, Guard Frank Costa, and Doyle Crosshaw, tackle, learned how to handle a few situations without the aid of their three defensive stars who had been shelved with injuries.

Beside Berry, Newport ball packers who showed amazing amounts of aptitude at eluding tacklers as they zoomed over the white stripes were: Melvin Smalley and Don Jones, halfbacks.

Torrance threatened seriously only once. Early in the third quarter Tartar Quarterback Boyd Crawford starting connect-backs to the wall, the Tartars

started from their own 12-yard line and marched to the 2-yard marker before losing the ball on a fumble.

## Tartars Seek Rebound on Inglewood Turf

Torrance's passing attack, which has been the brightest hue in this year's Tartar football picture, will probably be first in the line of action Friday night when Coach Eddie Cole's charges open their Bay League season at Inglewood.

Outcome of the contest has been rated a tossup with the edge, if there is one, going to Inglewood.

That the Tartar hope for victory lies in the air lanes, was demonstrated in the locals' two games this season. In the Rosemead game, two touchdowns were the results of neatly executed pass plays. Playing against a tough Newport Harbor eleven, Torrance last week completed 12 passes of the 20 attempted to run up a net gain of 127 yards. This compared with a net gain of 108 yards gained on the ground.

Doing most of the pitching for the Tartars will be "spinning" Quarterback Boyd Crawford and Chuck Vorhis. Their slants will be gathered in (or so Coach Eddie Cole hopes) by Wendal Vaughn and John Kulp.


Big question mark in the Torrance lineup Friday night will be Joe Clevenger, fullback. Clevenger is nursing a shoulder injury and may not see much action. Also, new faces may be provided in the line, where Coaches Rex Welch and Cole have not been entirely satisfied.

As has been the case during the past three years, Inglewood's Sentinels are using the T-formation this season.

Sentinel Coach Arnega (successor to Doug Essick, now at El Camino) has nothing but praise for his ace in the slot this season—Quarterback Joe Clark, 160-pound senior who is one of the three returning lettermen. Clark has been tabbed as one of the finest passers and ball handlers in Inglewood history.

Other lettermen with the Inglewood team this year are Right Tackle Barry Smith, a 195-pound senior, and Left Guard Don Mann, 150-pound senior.

Game time at the Inglewood High School stadium is 8 p. m.
