Rugweaving Interests Woman, 85

"I just can't stand being idle," said Mrs. Johanna Morgensen, who was born in Denmark on October 10, 1864 and who says that she's going to spend 1964 in Torrance. An active student in the rugmaking class at the Torrance School of Adult Education, Mrs. Morgensen is now making a bridal rug, for a Christmas present—first in a series of six gifts for each of her children, which she herself plans to make.

"My main ambition," said Mrs. Morgensen, "is to improve my rugmaking. I make rugs out of old draperies, rags, my son's shirts, and my niece's dresses. My rugs may be red, green, blue, orchid—all depends you know—on the color of the shirts and the dresses."

Mrs. Morgensen is a blue eyed, alert woman just five feet tall, with a well-rounded 130 pound frame. She is alert in her step and vivacious in her talk. She lives with her daughter Mrs. Walter Bradford, at 1225 Greenwood avenue. When asked how long she had been in Torrance Mrs. Morgensen shaped back: "On and off for fifteen years—I'm like a bad penny, I always come back."

Gypsy Ring's emcee mfwy Mrs. Morgensen feels that more women in the community should learn to make rugs—especially the three by five kind—t' dress up the home and make life more livable. The class meets on Wednesday, from 9 to 12 at the Methodist Church.
