

Colville Resigns from Local Recreation Post

The resignation of David Colville from his position with the Torrance Recreation Commission was revealed to the City Council last week by Robert E. Lee, recreation commission chairman.

Colville, who has been a member of the commission since its inception early in 1948, resigned when it became apparent that his job would take him out of the city. He now lives at 2471 Torrance boulevard.

He will assume duties as the district manager of Union Oil operations in the Norwalk district.

Since moving to Torrance five years ago, Colville has served as a board member with the Y.M.C.A. and was president of the Kiwanis Club last year.

In notifying the City Council of Colville's status, Lee said that the Recreation Commission accepted Colville's resignation "very reluctantly and with a deep feeling of loss."

The commission went on record commending the untiring efforts of Colville in his unselfish, volunteer, civic work and felt that public acknowledgment should be made of "this fine citizen."

City to Knock The Kinks Out Of Crenshaw

Crenshaw boulevard is going to be "de-kinked." The State Division of Highways has approved city plans for elimination of two right-angled jogs on Crenshaw boulevard at 190th street, City Manager George W. Stevens announced Tuesday.

The plans call for grading and paving of a new, curved right-of-way west of the existing intersection. The work would relieve motorists of two irksome stops now necessary for north-south traffic.

Plans for smoothing traffic flow on the heavily traveled boulevard was motivated by a future county project which will extend Crenshaw boulevard south of its present Sepulveda boulevard terminus, across Palms Verdes Hills to the bay. A call for bids for the job removing job may be issued next week, City Manager Stevens said.

City Notes Street Costs

An estimated 14 miles of thoroughfares were maintained by the city during the 1948-49 fiscal year, according to a report submitted Monday by City Manager George Stevens to the State Division of Highways. Including work on pavement, street lighting and trees, the city spent \$150,178.29 for maintenance operations, Stevens said. Of this sum, \$143,618.61 came from county and city taxes and \$6,559.68 was derived from state gasoline tax allocations.

New Homes May Swell Population 4000 by 1950, Patrick Claims

Tract maps for housing subdivisions which will probably bring an estimated 4000 additional people to Torrance by 1950, are on file with Building Inspector John Patrick. A total of 1236 homes are included in the plans.

Scheduled to be scanned by the Torrance Planning Commission at its mid-month meeting are tentative maps for a 338-unit development north of the Seaside Ranchos tract by the Gamsin Co. of Altadena. A business area is proposed for Sepulveda boulevard frontage.

Also up for approval is a final map for 50 homes proposed for construction near 190th street and Arlington avenue by the Johnson Construction Company and part of an ultimate 170-home tract planned for 164th street and Arlington avenue.

A preliminary map for 88 homes of K. Sande Scness' Pacific Hills tract in Waleria was approved at the Planning Commission meeting Tuesday night.

Wall Work Goes Into High Gear

High speed fabrication methods started Monday at the \$59,000 community building now under construction at Lomita Park.

An official of the McKittrick Co., which is doing the work, said that the sides and roof of the structure will be swung into place by a huge crane in about five days.

The building, which includes an assembly hall, basketball court, a stage, office, and locker rooms is expected to be ready for occupancy about January 1, the company official stated.
