

LOCAL BOARD OF EDUCATION GOES ALL-OUT FOR SANTA CRUZ CONCLAVE

The Torrance Board of Education was 100 per cent in attendance at the 19th Annual Convention of the California School Trustees Association, held in Santa Cruz from Sunday, October 2 through Wednesday, October 5.

Theme of the convention was "The Public Schools—Our Individual Responsibility."

Mrs. Grace Wright and Mrs. Evelyn Carr served on the convention hospitality committee and Dr. Howard Wood, president of the Torrance board, served as chairman of one of the discussion groups on secondary education, Tuesday afternoon.

The Wednesday sessions were held jointly with the California Association of School Superintendents as is the annual custom.

In attendance at the convention from Torrance were Dr. and Mrs. Howard A. Wood, Mr. and Mrs. Carl D. Steele, Mrs. Evelyn Carr, Mrs. Grace Wright, Judge John A. Shidler and Dr. J. H. Hull. So far as is known, the Torrance Board was the only board with 100 per cent attendance at the convention.

Also representing Torrance was C. V. Jones, who is the Torrance district delegate to the El Camino College board of directors.

Students Start Memorial for Crash Victim

Funds for a memorial glass window have been allocated by the students of Vina Danks Junior High School, to tribute Miss Ramona DeBra, a teacher at the school and a former Torrance resident, who was killed in the train-bus crash 11 days ago in Ontario.

The window will be placed in the Long Beach First Methodist Church of which the former Torrance High School student was a member.

The 23-year-old Miss DeBra was the daughter of Eugene F. DeBra of the DeBra Radio Company, 1517 Cabrillo avenue.

Plans for the memorial to the former music teacher were developed when it was announced that students would not send flowers to Saturday's Memorial service, but that money intended for floral offerings would be used for the window.

Miss DeBra who was one of 17 persons killed in the tragic crash of a March Field Army Air Base bus and a train on October 2 was tributed by Superintendent Bruce Miller as an outstanding teacher who gave unstintingly of her professional talents and warm personality. She is recalled as one who was beloved by pupils and teachers alike.

Prior to her death Miss DeBra maintained legal residence with her mother Mrs. Elsa DeBra of 525 Walnut street, Long Beach. Before moving to the beach city the DeBras lived at 1325 Encarnacion avenue.
