Tartar's Fate To Be Judged Tomorrow

At approximately 10:30 tomorrow night we'll know whether our Torrance High School Tartars are destined to "go anywhere" this season.

For upon the outcome of the local game with Beverly Hills at the Torrance High School field, rests the difference between a possible first division berth in the Bay League standings or the ignominy which comes at the bottom of the heap. In this sense the game is, as they say—crucial.

Despite the two exhibitions of solid, heads-up football displayed by Coach Eddie Cole's undermanned Tartars in their first two Bay League encounters, they wound up on the short end in the Inglewood and Santa Monica games. Sparking the hilltoppers are Johnny Mann, a 155-pound senior who covets from the right half back position, and Jerry Rosenberg, 200-pounds of hard hitting right tackle.

Despite the early season misfortunes, Torrance goes into tomorrow's game a two-to-three touchdown favorite. Reason for optimism is based on a volley of big "ifs."

Biggest IF is Fullback Joe Clevenger. Joltin' Joe was groomed as a running mate for the Tartar's overworked Quarterback Boyd Crawford. However, an early season shoulder dislocation has kept him sidelined. His shoulder protected by


yards of tape and pounds of sponge rubber padding. Clevenger will be in there tomorrow night.
