

# Coach Eddie Cole 'Cleans' Grid House

## Tough Drill Prime Locals for El Segundo

Leather ka-wumped against helmets and beneath shoulder pads, made the hot afternoon sun even hotter while some 40 Tartar varsitymen toiled methodically and wordlessly.

Coach Eddie Cole was "cleaning house."

"We've got three games left," Cole told reporters, "El Segundo-Redondo-Beech and Jordan. And during those three games, we're going to block and tackle. REALLY block and tackle."

By the time the Tartars hit the showers last night, they had a good idea of what Coach Cole meant. Finesse, as such, took a back seat and bodily contact of the teeth-jarring variety had been placed in the driver's seat.

The old block and tackle system will be employed in an attempt to lower the boom on El Segundo tomorrow afternoon.

Other auspicious notations of Coach Cole's cleaning house campaign were found in his proposed starting lineup for tomorrow's game. Jim Leech at tackle and Joe Clevenger, fullback, were benched as ineffectual following some of the gridiron breaches of conduct. Herb Dimon will start in Leech's position; Chuck Vorhis, utility man, will carry the load at fullback.

Sophomore Cal Browning will start at left end since John Kulp is nursing a hip injury picked up in the Leuzinger game. Jimmy Dummeyer will start at right guard.

In tomorrow's game—the first to be played during the afternoon this season—the El Segundo Oilers will be striving to upset their way into the Bay League win column. They have lost games to Beverly Hills, Jordan, Santa Monica and Redondo in that order.

Chuck Logan at right half, Math Diederich at fullback and Joe Ramsay at left half have been and will be capable backfield performers for El Segundo this season. Logan is a 165-pound senior, Diederich is a 160-pound senior and Ramsay is a 160-pound senior.

Two standout pigskinners perform double duty on the forward wall. Bob Van Hosen, is an All-Bay League center from last season. John von Flue, right guard, is one of the best blockers on the club. Both boys will see action on defense and offense.

## State Reminds Deer Hunters to Return Tags

With the reminder that California's final deer hunting season ended one-half hour after sunset, October 15, the Division of Fish and Game this week coupled an appeal for return of deer tags by successful hunters.

State law requires the return of validated tags, Division spokesmen pointed out, yet almost 50 per cent of successful hunters fail to mail them in. The tag return figures are based on results of a per cent poll of hunters conducted by Opinion Research Center of Denver.


Information compiled from tags provides State game biologists with facts for recommending future seasons, bag limits, and other conservation policies.

## Leuzinger Ground Attack Buries Tartar Varsity Under 38-0 Tide

The Bay League, which for many moons has seen the increasingly popular razzle-dazzle and pass become the ace in the hole scoring punch, had better step long enough for a second look.

The reason: Leuzinger. Friday night, while some 2000 local rooters and the Tartar varsity waited and watched for the sleight of hand and the spectacular, the Leuzinger Olympians slammed off tackle and around center to roll up the amazing total of 534 yards on the ground. Blocking and fast running, as fundamental as a set of goal posts, buried the Torrance High School hopes for a successful grid season under a crushing 38 to 0 score.

Of course, the system didn't operate on its own merit alone. What may be entered in the record books as the best backfield in the Bay League, Leuzinger ball packers spun through the line and took advantage of every opportunity to roll up the big

count. With Don Paulson in the formation slot, Johnny Lewis playing fullback, and Ed Schmidt and Bill Angel at the halfback posts, the blue and white ground attack proved too much for the undermanned Tartars.

Our Tartars looked best in the early stages of the game. With the patrons still shifting for comfortable seating arrangements, Center Pete Douroux—who along with End Wendell Vaughn later were ejected from the rough contest for excessive enthusiasm in stopping Leuzinger runners—intercepted one of Paulson's heaves. He broke around his left end, flipped the ball to Dandoy who raced to the Leuzinger seven yard marker.

However, with the opportunity to draw first blood, the Tartars were held for four downs. After an exchange of punts, Leuzinger took over the pigskin on their own 18. Seaback Schmidt, on a quick opening play carried the ball to the 27. On the following play, Angel

took the oval from Paulson, stepped through a gaping hole in the Tartar forward wall, avoided the local secondary and galloped 73 yards to pay dirt.

For all intents and purposes, that was the game. Leuzinger had lowered the boom.

The Blue and White carried a 13-0 lead into the half time break.

Noteworthy of comment in the second half running spree, was a 91 yard run by Lewis who galloped from his own nine to Torrance pay dirt for the third Leuzinger TD.

### Sentinel Passer Could Snarl League Race

Inglewood's chances to upset the thus-far unbeatable Santa Monica grid powerhouse rests tonight on the supple, whip-like arm of Sentinel quarterback Joe Clark.

Clark, upon whose fancy flinging Inglewood has depended to win ball games this year will be on the spot when the Vikings take to the Inglewood field tomorrow night.
