## Crenshaw Job Under Way At 190th St.

"Unbending" of the dog-leg job in Crenshaw boulevard at 190th street was under way yesterday, according to City Manager George W. Stevens.  
The project will absorb \$15,000 and is expected to be completed within 45 days.

Where a full right and left turn are necessary now when traveling north on Crenshaw boulevard, the southerly portion of the much-traveled road will be curved to meet the northern portion. The move is designed to ease flow of traffic and eliminate safety hazards.

Widening of the thoroughfare from its present two lanes to four lanes cannot be done under the present budget appropriation, Stevens said, but a long-range program calls for eventual improvement of the entire right-of-way through the city.

## Editorial

Contrary to the Union's oft repeated and published attacks, that the management of The Herald has refused to meet and negotiate with the Union, the record shows the undisputed FACT that The Herald has met frequently with the Union representatives.

For those who are interested in this unwarranted wildcat strike, The Herald wishes to briefly report the following developments, which are the result of recent negotiations with both the Local and International officers of the Union and their attorneys. Results of the latest offer for settlement made by The Torrance Herald includes the following:

1. The Herald has expressed its willingness to create additional jobs in order to enable the re-employment of those union printers who walked off their jobs on February 11, 1949, who are not now employed elsewhere.
2. Returning union printers would be paid the current union scale, (the same as present employees) of \$87.50 to \$101.50 per week of 37 1/2 hours, composed of five shifts of 7 1/2 hours each, worked over a five-day week. (This was the principal item of the dispute which resulted in the printers' walk-out Feb. 11, 1949.)
3. Time and one-half pay for all work over 7 1/2 hours a day and 37 1/2 hours a week.
4. Two weeks' vacation with pay for all printers after one year's work; and one day vacation with pay for each 25 days worked for all other printers.
5. Returning union printers will be given their full seniority.
6. Future vacancies on the staff will be filled with qualified journeymen WITHOUT DISCRIMINATION. Management will notify the Union when vacancies occur and Union may submit applicants. No discrimination will be shown between Union members and non-union members.
7. Whenever union printers are in a majority, Herald will, if the Union desires, attempt to reach a proper collective bargaining agreement.

A study of the above offer will reveal that The Herald has gone as far as it is possible LEGALLY to meet the Union demands. The Herald, however, WILL NOT and CANNOT LEGALLY, discharge its present loyal, efficient printers without exposing the publishers to indictment for UNLAWFUL PRACTICE under the National Labor Relations Act. The penalty for such ILLEGAL action would be re-instatement of its present printers, and the Herald would end-up with two COMPLETE and DUPLICATING staffs. This would result in failure to survive and the loss of all jobs for all workers. Obviously The Herald cannot consider such demands by the Union, and remain in business.

## City Approves Youth Nabbed By Deputies

Permits for construction of 16 homes on the 3300 block of Danaha street were issued to the Senness Corporation last week by John R. Patrick, building inspector. Value of construction is estimated at about \$112,000.

Permission was also granted to Tony Ormonde for construction of a \$6800 residence at 17022 Casimir avenue, and to Tony Prietas for a \$6800 home at 17012 Casimir avenue.
