# Tartars Hold Seahawk Attack for Three Frames, Then BOOM-erang

The forward pass—at once, football's most beautiful and also its most sickening weapon—turned the final quarter of the Torrance Redondo fray Thursday night into the sourest twelve minutes of action the Tartars have experienced all season. Misdirection of passes in high places gave Redondo its 33 to 6 triumph.

The Tartar varsity, by slint of a stellar goal line stand and a powerful touchdown drive which carried 80 yards on a well coordinated ground and air assault, entered the final canto with a 5-6 tie. But then the roof caved in.

The Redondo Seahawks got off to an early lead immediately after the opening kickoff. After taking Higgin's kickoff and returning it to their own 35, Redondo sent Ronnie Cook off tackle and shook him loose for a 30-yard gallop. Three plays later Cook hit the center of the Torrance line, bounced off several Tartar tacklers and raced to pay dirt.

Here the Tartars stiffened. Behind the courageous defensive play of Tartar linemen Costa, Douroux and others Torrance stifled a seemingly powerful Seahawk attack until the fatal last period. The Tartar defense was pointed up in the second quarter when Redondo, with a first down on the Torrance three-yard line, not only were held from scoring but were pushed back to the 14.

Torrance looked its best after the halftime break when it took the pigskin from the kickoff and never gave it up until it had crossed into pay territory. In the march, Dandoy first picked up 12 yards to bring the ball to the Torrance 32. A Crawford pass to Dandoy carried to the 42, where Crawford again connected, this time to Wendell Vaughn to march into Redondo territory. Four more running plays, climaxing by a 10 yard dash by Dandoy, gave the Tartars their TD.

Soon after the start of the final period, the Seahawks broke the 6-6 tie, punching over from one yard out. This was probably the strategic turn of the game for it forced the Tartars into the "pass and pray" type of offense.

And from the final score, indications are that neither the passes nor the prayers were enough.




