

ORDER OF ARROW SETS 'CALLING OUT' RITES

To the accompaniment of Indian dances and the throbbing of tom-toms, the Gabrielino Chapter, Order of the Arrow will hold its regular semi-annual Calling Out Ceremony on the evening of November 19 at Fort MacArthur, San Pedro. This beautiful ceremony, when new members are initiated into the mysteries of the Order, will be a part of a District Camp, sponsored by the Order of the Arrow, to be held next weekend at Fort MacArthur. The evening ceremonies are open to the public.

The Order of the Arrow is a national brotherhood of Scout honor campers whose members have been elected from their Troops as demonstrating outstanding excellence in camping and general Scoutcraft. The Order is dedicated to service to Scouting and the community. Its members are very active in community and Scout service, giving many hours of their time in worthwhile activities.

This District Camp, sponsored by the Order of the Arrow, is for the purpose of bringing together all of the Troops of the Harbor District for a weekend of camping and general fellowship. Over 1000 Scouts and leaders will compete for the honor of their Troop in camping and special projects. Each Troop will camp under canvas, cook its own meals over an open fire, and demonstrate Scouting skills. The operation of the camp is under the supervision of Explorer Post 115X of Lomita, with all of the camp management being handled by the Scouts.

Since the camp is being held on the Fort MacArthur military reservation, the Army will be very much in attendance. An Army Medical Department first aid unit will be on hand to aid in first aid practices as well as to treat the minor nicks and bruises inherent in any camp. The commanding general of the Fort will make a personal inspection of the camp, and address the assembled Scouts. The full facilities of the Fort are being thrown open to the Scouts in an effort to make this District Camp the finest ever.

For the convenience of any Torrance citizen who may wish to visit the camp and see some real Scouting in action, the campsite is located at the south end of the military reservation between Pacific Ave. and the ocean. The evening ceremony will

be held at the ball park within the Fort. The general public is cordially invited.

Troop 721 of Torrance, recently made an overnight hike to Sturtevant Falls in Big Santa Anita Canyon. The hike, under the leadership of Scoutmaster Wendell Walker, began the hike from Chantry Flats, just above the town of Sierra Madre, and then proceeded down to the floor of the canyon and up the scenic trail bordering the Big Anita river to the falls. There the Troop camped for the night and returned to Torrance the next day.

The main purpose of this hike was to give the members of the Troop further experience in packing and hiking methods, in addition to giving the Scouts opportunities for making interesting side trips. Eighteen Scouts participated in the hike with five leaders in charge. Scoutmaster Walker was aided by Gene Jones, Assistant Scoutmaster, Byrle Jones, Senior Patrol Leader, Kenneth Tuttle, Troop Chairman, and Committee members Dick Beckerydyte and Ross Wooster. Schools to Aid Children With Speech Difficulties

Ever since primitive man began sending up smoke signals, we human beings have been vitally concerned with the problem of communicating with each other. Today, in an age of radio, television, and motion pictures, much of our success in life, financial and social, depends upon our ability as individuals to "put across" our ideas. The ability of a person to speak well frequently determines how far that person will go in business or in social life. Yet, few people realize that approximately ten per cent of the children in our public schools have some sort of speech difficulty. This means that unless corrective measures are taken, this ten per cent will be handicapped for the rest of their lives in seeking jobs, promotions, or even in finding a mate.

By a "speech deficiency" we mean a stutter, or a lisp, de-

layed speech or "baby talk," or any proclivity in speech that calls attention to itself and interferes with communication.

The Board of Education of the Torrance Unified Schools, has added a speech teacher to the Special Pupil Services. A survey of all children in the lower grades is now being conducted to determine which of the students need help with their speech problems.

Since many speech difficulties are due to such non-physical causes as poor habits, lack of
