

Pacific Hills Tract Offers 88 More Homes

Starting of sales in the second unit of Pacific Hills, the K. Saddle Senness "Homes of Tomorrow", G.I. residential development in South Torrance, was announced this week by the builder.

The new homes, designed for outdoor living, are located on Newton street, at Pacific Coast Highway between Crenshaw and

The second unit offers 88 two- and three bedroom homes with living rooms overlooking rear yards for the most in California patio living.

This new unit is valued at \$775,000.


In the first unit, Senness sold 59 homes. He anticipates an early sale of the second unit because the residences are in line

with the national trend of design for indoor-outdoor living, he claims.

The 88 homes now are under construction in a gently sloping section of the historic Weston Ranch, described by the builder as one of the most desirable homesite areas in Los Angeles County for moderately-priced veteran residences.

The second unit, said Senness, is offered under straight G.I. financing terms of no down payment, with appliances optional at a slight increase in the monthly payments.

Senness, now in his 11th year as a home builder in Southern California, has constructed nearly 4000 dwellings in "Homes of Tomorrow" tracts. He is a director of the Home Builders Institute, an association of merchant-builders.

1000 Good Neighbors Average 3 1/2 Pancakes

Amid the welcoming shout of "Hi Neighbor," more than 1000 persons tucked away pancakes and sausage at the YMCA sponsored Good Neighbor breakfast last Saturday morning.

Gives Advice

O. A. Kresse, general superintendent of the Columbia Steel plant here, Thursday told an assembly of the American Iron and Steel Institute that western methods of producing steel can rival those produced in the east by close control over material and operation.

According to Kresse, many open hearth plants in the west have no recourse to hot metal, which is widely used in steel plants elsewhere because it has tens the steelmaking process. Therefore, he said, cold scrap which is used in the west must be carefully selected and other controls must be exercised during the processing of the metal.






