To introduce the new school nurse, Miss M. M. Mathis, Orange Street kindergarten mothers entertained at an enjoyable breakfast given Tuesday morning in the auditorium.

Mothers were instructed on care of their children and proper procedure to follow when a child is being re-entered after an illness. Miss Mathis advised that a note is necessary following a child's brief absence and if the absence has exceeded five days, the child must have been checked by a doctor or the school nurse.

Emphasis was placed by the nurse on the necessity for a good breakfast and proper rest and sleep for each child.

A monthly check-up of pupils will reveal possible cases of ringworm, temperature, colds, etc.
