Each A Star


Each of us, in our way, is an actor. We have an audience that emulates our actions and repeats our words. We are their inspiration to do right or wrong.

 3. Put the letter in another envelope and send it to Pan American World Airways, Seattle, Washington, Attention Santa Claus.
 4. Letters must reach Seattle or Pan American District Sales Office not later than Monday, December 12, 1949.
- If Pan American receives the letters by December 12, the Airline will fly them to Fairbanks, Alaska and mail them in the Fairbanks Post Office after a pause of three minutes for the dog sled trip to the North Pole and back. Fairbanks has been officially designated by Santa Claus as the Post Office nearest to the North Pole.
