

PRODAN DROPS CROWN AFTER WINNING IT

Three days after his Prodan-Foote five won the championship of the first round of the "Black" Friday division of the City Basketball League in a playoff game with Fenwick. Manager Tony Prodan voluntarily forfeited the game, giving the championship to Fenwick.

Prodan forfeited the game after he investigated protests that college players had played for his team during the game contrary to rules, during his absence. He said he learned the outside players were invited to play by other players on the team when two teammates failed to show up at game time.

Prodan was still investigating a possibility college players had as casually played in another

first round game with Fenwick. The officers of the league were to meet late Wednesday night to investigate whether Prodan-Foote should forfeit another game to National Supply because Prodan's team failed to meet the deadline for the first game of the second round.

The Prodan-Foote playoff victory over Fenwick was a tight game which Prodan-Foote led with a small margin to finally win 46-45.

Danny Espinoza was top man for the winners with 20 tallies, outclassing Georgie Lee, Fenwick's top hoopster, who scored 15 for the losers. Fenwick was heavily hampered by the virtual loss of Jack Turner, usually good

for about 9 points. Jack suffered a sprained ankle and could only play around the edges without scoring.

Espinoza scored again Friday night for Prodan-Foote with 22 baskets in a 55-37 victory over the Merchants in the second game of second round play. Al Widner led the Merchants with 13 points.

Fenwick had an easy win of 47-30 over Reed's Friday night with Jack Turner knocking out 17 points for the winners. Jim Butcher was best man for Reed's with 15. Torrance Teachers forfeited to National Supply.

As a result of the lopsided

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

Leech, a junior at Torrance High School, went through the entire season without much more serious injury than a mild case of dandruff. Last week during gym period, the gristler leaped-up to recover a backboard shot during a basketball game. He came down with his elbow where his feet should be.

Doctors discovered through X-rays that he had fractured his elbow. Tuesday morning Dr. Clifford Easley and Dr. Rodney Stetson operated on his right arm. Leech is on the mend at the Torrance Memorial Hospital.

The mishap had Coach Eddie Cole, groaning "What next?" He had in mind a similar accident that happened to Jack Faran, another one of his gridiron performers. Faran went through the season unharmed only to break his arm in a touchfootball game
