## 'World Peace' Discussed Before PTA Membership

"One out of every two persons faces starvation in the world today," Mrs. LeRoy Bailey told Parent-Teacher Association members and other civic leaders of this area Thursday night when she appeared as guest speaker for Orange Street PTA.

Meeting in the auditorium of Narbonne High School, Mrs. Bailey, who is international relations chairman for the California Congress of Parents and Teachers and of Los Angeles Tenth District, was supported on the speakers platform by Mrs. Alexis Jacobauski, international relations chairman of First District PTA and Stewart Stengel, curriculum consultant for Los Angeles City School. Forming a panel, the group discussed the topic, "The World's Work for Peace."

The evening's discussion embraced UNESCO, United Nations Economic Scientific Cultural Organization, and WHO, World Health Organization.

Speaking in behalf of the work of UNESCO was Mr. Stengel while Mrs. Jacobauski, outlined the work of the WHO.

Mrs. Bailey said that their interest in education and concern for world peace prompted the Parent-Teacher Associations to make a study of the work of the United Nations.

The organization of both groups, their policies, number of delegates required from the various nations of the world as well as the financial obligation of each country represented, preceded the outline of the program of these two groups.

Striving to make people happy no matter what their nationality or customs are has been the leading factor in outlining the great program of both organizations. It was brought out that food and shelter must be provided for everyone round the world, that world understanding must be developed, people must learn to live together, barriers eliminated and social and religious prejudices removed and there must be an exchange of ideas among people everywhere.
