

Magazine Says Steel Mill Fate To Be Told Soon

An announcement concerning the fate of Columbia's cold-reduction sheet steel mill, is expected momentarily by U. S. Steel officials in the east, claims a recent article in "The Iron Age," leading trade journal of the iron and steel industry.

The announcement, said the article, will state whether Columbia will go ahead with plans and, if, how much more delay is probable.

The magazine article stated that presidents of the various U. S. Steel subsidiaries were in the east debating policy matters. Local opinions were that the conversion of the former Alcoa plant would continue.

Claiming that some speculation that Columbia feels steel facilities in the west are now

adequate, the article stated that all evidence points to the eventual usage of the plant by the steel company.

The trade journal article stated: "Several months ago, Irving S. Olds, chairman of the board for U. S. Steel, reiterated in Salt Lake City that his company would go ahead with plans for the cold-reduction mill.

"Alden Roach, president of Columbia, is said to have assured Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce officials only recently that the development program had been delayed but not dropped.

"At the time of the purchase of the property from the government, Mr. Olds and Benjamin Fairless told of plans which would have had the mill operating by this time. They may have had to redesign several features and are certain to have required new and lower estimates for equipment.

"Whatever their eventual decision, they have a multi-million dollar investment awaiting action.

"Two women asked one evening what they could do with their spare time. They told about their interests and aptitudes; and was sent to the textile painting class and the other leathercraft—where both are doing a fine job."
