

Victory Predicted for Equal Rights Amendment

The President of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., Dr. K. Frances Scott of Northampton, Mass., in Washington, D. C., predicted victory in the U. S. Senate for the Equal Rights Amendment.

"The 150,000 business and professional women in our organization are greatly heartened at the reports of the impending success of the Equal Rights Amendment," she said. "This measure which clears up the inequalities now attached to American women has been a thorny issue since 1923 when it was first introduced in the Con-

gress. Our first assurance that American public opinion was overwhelmingly for this measure came in 1946 when the bill was given a favorable vote by a majority in the Senate, although it did not receive the two-thirds vote necessary to effect its passage.

"Now, through the activity of American women, the generalship of Senator Guy Gillette, of Iowa, and the splendid cooperation of Senate Majority Leader Scott Lucas, of Illinois, we can feel hopeful of the outcome.

"Both political parties have, through their platforms, recognized the need for this legisla-
