Now resting in fifth place, a win by the Tartars would boost the locals into a tie with Jordan for fourth place.


Coch Cliff Graybehl says he

27 Teams Start 'Y' League Play Monday, Mar. 13

There will be 27 teams in three Y.M.C.A. softball leagues this year, Milton Isbell, executive secretary of the "Y," announced following an organizational meeting of team leaders this week.

The leagues will be divided into age groups. Boys under 11 years old will have nine teams in the PeeWee League; boys from 11 to 13 will have nine teams in the Midgets; and boys from 13 to 15 will be classed as Juniors.

Approximately 350 to 400 or about half of the boys in those age groups in Torrance are expected to participate in the games.

League play will start Monday, March 13, and games will be played at Municipal Park, Fern avenue, Waleria and Seaside playgrounds every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday throughout the season, giving every team at least one game a week.

Every effort will be made, Isbell said, to get representation from every area including North Torrance, the Shoestring Strip, Hollywood Riviera, Seaside Ranchos and Waleria.


If the Does complete their unbeaten record, the Blue-Black game will probably be held Washington's Birthday.

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
