Flower Show Deadline Set

While orchids are expected to provide the major attraction at the 12th annual Southern California Spring Flower and Garden Show, April 20-23, thousands of other spring blooms will offer close competition in more than 200 classes for amateurs and private growers. It was announced by show manager Victor H. Pinckney, Jr. The four-day event will be staged in the Fannie E. Morrison Horticultural Center in Pasadena's Brookside Park.

Elaborate gardens and patios, flower arrangements and scores of cut blossoms from all parts of the nation and foreign countries will constitute a floral panorama throughout the Center's four buildings and five acres of ground, Pinckney said. Daffodils, tulips, roses, irises and camellias will be featured.

Announcing the deadline for entries, April 16, Pinckney reminded prospective exhibitors that there is no entry fee. Nurseries and florists garden clubs and arrangement specialists, the "green thumbs" and the top professionals, all are welcome to participate in the show, he said.

REDUCING EXPERT GIVES WEIGHT-GAINING ADVICE

"Some of the stars look as though they've been put through a wringer," declares Lindlar. "A little padding of fat on the body frame is very attractive. Besides, that padding of fat serves a good purpose. It helps protect the nerves, the way insulation guards an electric cord. It helps conserve body heat — and in a very real sense it actually warms the disposition. You'll not only feel better if you're not too thin, you'll also find that your nerves and temper won't be so much on edge."

Of course, Lindlar put out, thin people need the same kind of balanced diet that everyone else ought to have. But special dishes can be of particular help and he suggests one that usually proves successful in putting pounds on "skinnyies."
