Need A Job? Stenographers Wanted By Job Agency Here

Don't all rush at once, girls, but there are jobs waiting right here in Torrance for stenographers, especially for experienced ones. Miss Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance office of the California State Department of Employment, said yesterday that she has openings now for more stenographers than she can find and asked the Herald to help. So here's the story, girls: She can place three or four girls every week, and although she can sometimes use inexperienced girls who start at \$125 a month, most of the openings are for girls who can take dictation at the rate of 100 to 120 words a minute. Beginning salaries for experienced girls range up to \$275 a month, with the average around \$200 with advancement promised in almost all jobs. There's a catch. Few of the places needing girls have public transportation to the door, so you'll need to make some kind of arrangements for transportation.

NEW CHRISTIAN SCHOOL PLANS UNDER STUDY

Still under investigation and study this week is the plan for a new private school in the Hollywood Riviera area. The request from the South Bay Christian School for a zoning variance was denied by the City Council recently and referred to the planning commission. That matter, now under study by a committee from the planning commission, will be brought before the planners on April 4, according to John R. King, commission. The request for the zoning variance met with some objection from the Hollywood Riviera Homeowner's Association at a recent meeting of the city council. Commander William A. Mason, president of the association, asked the council to deny the school's request for a variance until a ample parking space had been provided and that the buildings conform to setback deed requirements. Construction of the new school was due to start the first of April, it was announced this week by Albert Trier, superintendent. Although only one wing to house the elementary school will be started immediately eventual plans call for the addition of a wing for a junior high school and an auditorium. The school will be located on the south side of Pacific Coast Highway with the rear of the school opposite El Retiro Park. Present enrollment of the school which includes Catholics, Jews and Protestants is approximately 108 students in grades from the kindergarten to the eighth grade, Trier said. Mrs. Harriette Condon, 1808 Arlington avenue, is a teacher of the fifth and sixth grade students. "Our school is not a religious institution," said Trier, a veteran of both world wars. "We take the single course approach to education. We stress the three 'R's' to which we have added the study of two others, 'Right and Rong,'" he said. "We do not train our students for the pulpit or attempt to indoctrinate them with any creed. We use the Bible as a text book and study it as a subject much the same as a science book or arithmetic. "We teach the students to apply Christian principles—in fact they teach themselves through a daily chapel service which is conducted entirely by the students. There is no adult preacher or minister at the chapel gatherings." The school, now in its fourth year, is presently located in Redondo. It is one of five such schools in the U. S., Trier stated.

State Patrol Cars to Have Blue Lights

Cars of the California Highway Patrol are being equipped with a blue light as well as a red one for use in emergencies, Commissioner Clifford E. Peterson announced this week. The blue light will be installed on the front of the vehicle opposite the red light. The Vehicle Code was amended in 1949 authorizing the additional colored light to provide positive and quick identification of Highway Patrol cars, the commissioner said. "A red light heralding the approach of a vehicle could be a police car, an ambulance or other emergency vehicle," Peterson stated. "With both a red and a blue beam shining together, motorists and pedestrians will know at once that the approaching car is one of the Highway Patrol."

Two Drivers Tangle With Barricades

Two drivers who tangled with road barricades at Western avenue and Torrance boulevard late at night on March 22 rued the experience, police reported. Police said one went to Harbor General Hospital and the other was arrested for drunken driving. Virgil Potter, 31, of 1631 West 220th street, was treated at the hospital after he swerved to miss the barricade and his car rolled over several times. The other driver, Russell Warner, 38, of Gardena, was later fined \$100 and his driver's license revoked by City Judge Otto B. Willet, after he ran through the barricades, which were erected to protect new paving there.

Fire Chief Posts Warnings About Vacant Lot Weeds

Cards labeled "Notice to Destroy Weeds" are being posted on private properties throughout the unincorporated areas of the county, County Fire Chief Spence D. Turner advised today. "These notices are to advise owners and tenants of the posted parcels that the weeds must be removed by April 10," Turner warned. "Otherwise, county crews may do the work and the cost will be charged against the property on the next tax bill," he said. Turner revealed that tractor crews will begin plowing under fire hazardous grasses and weeds beginning April 10 in the La Crescenta, Temple City, Norwalk, Lakewood Village, Maraleste-San Pedro, and City Terrace areas.

No Ceremony At Cremation Of Dane Here

A simple cremation without services, or attending minister was the gratified request of Nina Marie Bache, 77-year-old native of Denmark and resident of Long Beach, who died March 23 in Harbor General Hospital.
