A Sermonette Local Minister Reviews Meaning of Palm Sunday

Text: "The next day a great crowd who had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying, 'Hosanna! Blessed be he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!'" (John 12:12 and 13.)

Palm Sunday comes this week to remind us of that day almost 2000 years ago when Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem as the multitudes waved palm branches and shouted his praises. In a sense it was a great day of victory but those who shouted misunderstood its significance. To them it was a declaration of political power which they had hoped that Jesus would exert, but to Jesus it was the entrance into a week of conflict which was to lead to the cross.

In the gospel of Luke we are told that while the multitude shouted, Jesus drew near the city and wept over it saying, "Would that even today you knew the things that make for peace! But now they are hid from your eyes." Jesus looked beyond the superficial shouts of victory into the hearts of the crowds who on Friday would shout, "Crucify Him!" Jesus knew that, then as now, the things that make for peace among nations, as well as peace of mind and heart of the individual are love and sacrificial living in fellowship with God the

Father. When hatred and sin of all kinds fill the hearts of men, shouting praises on special occasions are meaningless.

On Palm Sunday and Easter millions of people will through the churches and shout praises to God. The sincerity of these shouts will be determined by the experiences of Good Friday. What really matters is whether we will be true to Jesus Christ when the time of testing comes. How much are we willing to sacrifice for the sake of Christ to show the Love of God to a lost and dying world?

Finish of Auto Display Room Expected May 1

Completion of a new and strictly modern new car showroom now under construction at Paul's Chevrolet, 1640 Cabrillo avenue, is expected by May 1, according to Paul Loranger, owner.

The story-and-half, nearly all glass building will be used to display from one to three new Chevrolets; as well as provide office space on the mezzanine. The grand opening in May will mark a milestone of growth of the local agency which began three years ago in June of 1947. G. P. Smog Control Unit In Operation

A new unit which will eliminate almost completely the burning of hydrogen sulfide has been placed in operation at the Torrance refinery of the General Petroleum Corporation. The hydrogen sulfide collected by the unit is pumped via a double, eight and one-half mile pipeline to the Hancock Chemical plant for conversion into sulfur. The General Petroleum unit and the pipeline cost over \$800,000. When present in gases burned as refinery fuel, hydrogen sulfide produces sulfur dioxide, one of the substances believed to contribute to Los Angeles smog conditions.

Recommend vote "No" on the following Charter Amendments:

1. Fair remuneration for Councilmen.
2. Good business to have department heads and city manager approve payments before they are made.
3. Establishes procedure to borrow money when needed. Establishes manner and time of repayment.
4. Adds jurisdiction of civil matters to our city court.
5. Leaves door open for employing technical employees from elsewhere without defining what is technical.
6. Attempts to amend State Constitution by Torrance alone. Ordinance possible to cover city employees.
7. Provides for a change of ordinance by re-enactment as amended without hearing on repeal, as no repeal action is needed.
8. City council may enact ordinance while under pressure, then let it die by authorizing city clerk by equal vote not to publish it.
9. I do not want to jeopardize Torrance by having licensed gambling authorized by the people themselves. It would be a mandate to councilmen to license all legal games. Previous charter amendments would not protect you from this amendment.
10. Grants City Council right to give away franchises intermediate up to 25 years on any public utility. Here could go our bus franchise without necessity of buying our buses.
11. Authorize City Attorney to hire permanent deputy without City Council approval and authorizes a salary "commensurate" to duties assigned.
12. Attempts to limit claims against city to a shorter period than allowed by state law.
