

## Permits For More Than 100 Homes Taken Out In Torrance This Week

Building permits for more than 100 new homes were issued this week by City Building Inspector John R. Patrick, including 66 homes of a proposed 300 to be built at Crenshaw boulevard and 190th street by Steinen & Horn. The 66 houses were valued at \$316,800.

Senness Corporation also took out permits for 36 houses and garages in Pacific Hills at a value of \$76,600.

## Four Torrance Men On New Harbor Welfare Board

Torrance and other harbor cities and towns now will have a direct part in the conduct of Welfare Federation of Los Angeles area, which operates the Community Chest and Welfare Council, through the newly-established Harbor District Board of which Floyd Y. Snyder, manager of Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, is temporary chairman.

Torrance members include Sam Levy, merchant, chairman of the '49 Chest campaign; W. T. Tillotson, American Rock Wool Corporation, Dean Sears, manager of Bank of America, and Warren W. Hamilton, chairman of 1st District Welfare Council. Lomita is represented by Mrs. John Kirsch; Rolling Hills by Kelvin C. Vanderlip, and Palos Verdes by Dr. Paul Reeder.

The Harbor Board will be responsible for and have authority over the organization and conduct of annual local Community Chest campaigns; operation of Community Chest-Serv-ice Centers, at 1339 Post avenue, Torrance, and 1427 Pacific avenue, San Pedro, and will work jointly with the local Welfare Council in regard to health and welfare needs.

Levy, Sears and Tillotson were appointed as a committee to study the facilities at the local Center.

Now composed of 21 representative citizens from San Pedro, Wilmington, and Gardena, as well as from the local communities, the Harbor Board will eventually be expanded so as to include representatives from business, labor, management, schools, churches and other major groups, according to Snyder. It will meet monthly to review conditions and to determine needs.
