One Injured Seriously in Auto Collision

One person was seriously injured and two others received minor hurts in a collision on Carson street near Dolores avenue late Friday afternoon.

Seriously injured was Mrs. Frieda Shaffer, 51, of 323 East 220th street, driver of one of the cars. She suffered possible fractured ribs and abrasions, and was given emergency treatment at Harbor General hospital. She was later released to a private physician.

Mrs. Shaffer had lain on the ceiling of the overturned car for approximately one-half hour before an ambulance arrived, bystanders said. Persons on the scene were reluctant to remove her from the car before medical attention arrived.

Joe B. Green, 35, of 3916 1/2 Cabrillo avenue, driver of the other car, and O. L. Ammon, 221 West Carson street, a passenger, were treated at the Harbor General hospital for minor injuries then released.

Firemen stood by the overturned Shaffer car which was leaking gasoline badly. The car had been flipped onto its top by the impact of the collision.

Toastmasters Install Officers

Harry D. Watkins, of the Beacon Cleaners and Dyers, and Lester Foster, elementary teacher in the Torrance school system, were installed as president and vice-president of Toastmasters at the Fish Shanty in Welteria Tuesday evening.

In installation ceremonies conducted by Harvey Edlen, area governor, Allen Pycatt, optometrist, was installed as secretary; M. C. Hunt, realtor, took over as treasurer; Sgt. G. S. "Bill" Evans, Torrance Police Department, as sergeant-at-arms; and Kenneth Ruffel, of Kenny's Shoe Repair, as the educational chairman.

City Building Boom Continues

The city's building boom continued to set a record-breaking pace this week as two builders received permits to construct nearly \$1 million worth of homes in Pacific Hills and North Torrance.

The Senness corporation will build 53 homes and 37 garages in the Pacific Hills district at a total cost of \$364,500. The Senness homes will be built on Newton street, Danaba street and Dalemead avenue.

C. F. Steinen and Steinen and Horn, Downey, received permits to build 118 units costing \$480,000 each in North Torrance. The total cost of these units will be \$566,400.

On a smaller scale, the Roman Catholic Archbishop received a permit to build a \$2000 addition to the second story of the Catholic Sisters' residence at 1421 Cota avenue, and T. R. Millstead will build a \$700 garage at 2112 Gramercy avenue.

Other permits went to Robert F. Wright for a residence to be built at 118 Via Buena Ventura, costing \$6500.

Wallace R. Pearson will build a residence at 284 Via Linda Vista at a cost of \$10,300, and Charles E. Hein received a permit to build a residence costing \$7100 at 2808 Carson street.

According to City Building Inspector John R. Partick, 1950 is well on the way to becoming a record building year in Torrance.

A total of 711 permits worth \$3,662,287 had been issued by March 31 of this year. Last year only 182 permits had been issued, for a total of \$646,786.

Record building year for Torrance was 1948, when 1675 permits were issued totaling \$7,979,825. Last year's total was \$7,296,905 and 1353 permits.

Last month 350 new permits were issued, 266 of them for new residences, and two for manufacturing buildings. Five permits were issued last month

Hollywood Dance Band to Play for Tartar Teen Club

Controller Announces Vehicle Tax Refunds

An estimated apportionment of \$21,348,919 to California cities from the motor vehicle license fee, or "in lieu" tax, for the next fiscal year, was announced this week by State Controller Thomas H. Kuchel.

Torrance will receive \$17,450 of this sum, according to Kuchel's announcement.

Fad Plaguuing New Car Owners May Be Waning

A prankish fad which has been dogging new car owners, may be dying out following the apprehension this week of four boys, Torrance police reported.

Particularly hard hit by the fad are 1950 Ford owners who have found their gaily-colored plastic coat of arms insignias disappearing from their cars faster than they can buy them.

The fad, according to two of the youths arrested, has been to carve the colorful emblems into belt buckles, purse ornaments and lapel pins.

Still another so-called use for the emblems has been as a barter medium. The youths would swap stolen emblems, much the same as stamp collectors trade stamps.

Two Ford emblems (because they are easy to swipe) are worth one De Soto emblem, the boys said. Value of the cars apparently having no bearing on the worth of the stolen emblems.

Two other youths were reported caught when a suspicious new Ford owner followed the two boys as they left church in the middle of the service last Sunday. He did not prefer charges, however.

Police records show that from 20 to 30 emblems have been reported stolen, while an unestimated number has been taken, but not reported.

The boys apprehended face juvenile court sentences of detention in Juvenile Hall or forestry camp duty.

G. P. PROMOTES TWO REFINERY EXECUTIVES

Weaver Guilty In Assault Case

Harold L. Weaver, 35, of 22410 South Normandie, was found guilty of assault with a deadly weapon and sentenced to one day in the county jail in Long Beach Superior Court Monday.

Weaver was shot up by Police January 23 after a shooting at his cafe, Gordo's Drive Inn, 1500 West Carson street.

He was accused of assaulting James Cullinan, 1682 West 214 street, when Cullinan and Weaver's divorced wife entered the cafe together. Cullinan was shot in the thigh while struggling for Weaver's gun.

Weaver recently announced that he was selling the drive-in on West Carson street, which was the scene of the shooting, to Milton and Madeline Ramsey.
