

Nicclo Sues City In Dairy Squabble

A suit which seeks to prevent the city from interfering with the operation of their dairy at 300 West 152nd street has been filed in Inglewood Superior Court by Peter and Anne Nicclo, it was revealed last week by City Attorney C. Douglass Smith.

The action, filed by Attorney David Armstrong, alleges that on March 14, the city council adopted a resolution permitting use of the property as a dairy and then unlawfully rescinded the action without notice on March 17. It also asserts that use of the site as a dairy has never been abandoned.

Named as defendants are the city and members of the former city council.

Action Promised On Ellinwood School Site

Students Score Hits on All But 3 Ballot Issues

A pre-election straw vote among the Student Council at Torrance High School only passed conforming to the actual outcome of the election on three issues.

Each member of the Student Council was responsible for studying an amendment, and presenting the arguments for and against the amendment to the other members of the Student Council, and to the members of a civics class. Following this discussion of the amendments in the civics class the Student Council conducted a straw vote among the members with the following results:

Amendment 1—13 yes, 0 no; Amendment 2—12 yes, 1 no; Amendment 3—0 yes, 4 no; Amendment 4—7 yes, 6 no; Amendment 5—10 yes, 3 no; Amendment 6—7 yes, 6 no; Amendment 7—3 yes, 10 no; Amendment 8—13 yes, 0 no; Amendment 9—2 yes, 11 no; Amendments 10 and 11 were not discussed due to the absence of the Council members assigned to these amendments. Amendment 12—13 yes, 0 no; Amendment 13—8 yes, 5 no; Amendment 14—10 yes, 3 no; Proposition No. 1—3 yes, 10 no.

The purpose of the discussion was to stimulate interest in the municipal election and provoke thoughtful discussion of the amendments.

The reaction of some students to this assignment was that their parents knew very little about what they were voting for and that the newspapers failed to provide adequate information on the measures presented to the voters.

The Council discussed the merits of some candidates but left the decision to their parents on the candidates.

Exhaustive Study Of City's Water System Finished

The long-awaited report on a survey of the city's water facilities will be ready next week, the City Council was told Tuesday night.

Representatives of the James C. Montgomery Company of Pasadena, the hydro-engineers who have been making the comprehensive study, told council officials that the work was completed and the report would be ready next week.

The report is expected to detail the needs for bringing the city's water system up to date.

Residents living near Plaza del Arroyo and Western avenue petitioned the council to convert the city dump near there into a park.

The petition, signed by 35 residents of the area, was retained by the council for study.

In a surprise move, Councilman Drake requested that the city manager be authorized to call for an examination for a city engineer. The council voted unanimously to concur.

City Manager George Stevens, who has been doing much of the city's engineering work, agreed that the need is great, but that qualified engineers are hard to find.

The council also approved recommendations of the planning commission that final tract maps for housing subdivisions totaling 252 lots be approved.

This action gave subdividers of those lots the green light for building.
