

## To the Rescue TAPs Receiving First Aid Hints

## All's Not Smooth Sailing For Transportation Fair

That the World Transportation Fair was not being received with an unconditional welcome to Santa Anita was indicated in reports from Arcadia citizens this week.

Objections to the fair and the traffic conditions were voiced from two separate residential areas bordering the famed race track.

Though the Los Angeles Turf Club has been successful in turning the WTF from Torrance by dangling the track's huge clubhouse, parking areas, and food facilities before the eyes of Ira W. Curry, managing director of the fair, all is not apparently "all set."

Curry must obtain a license from the City Council of Arcadia before he can open the fair. Some speculation was expressed in Arcadia that the residents of the two new home tracts might bring enough pressure on the council to cause the city fathers to turn down Curry's request for a permit.

On the other hand, business in the area is due to go on record in writing as officially endorsing the fair. Rumors, as far distant as Sac-

ramento, have Curry and The Los Angeles Turf Club in for a law suit for their respective actions in moving the fair from Torrance to Arcadia.

Meanwhile owners of the tract of land at 190th street and Western avenue, original site of the fair, are sitting tight watching developments.

The Dominguez Estates Company, owners of the Western avenue site, claim that Curry has made a deposit with them on a lease for the land. It is also claimed that a certain percentage of each ticket to the fair was to go to the Dominguez Estates Company. The various legal ramifications involved in such a transfer of sites and subsequent loss and gain of revenue may have interesting effect on the final site of the fair if it is staged.
