

# Early Trout Tales Run Hot and Cold

Torrance's opening weekend trout-seekers seemed to have had all kinds of luck — both good and bad.

Reports drifting into local sporting goods dealers and across the sports desk of the Torrance Herald indicate the local Isaac Waltons were hot and cold—especially cold.

Temperatures as low as 12 degrees causing metal guides on poles to freeze solid, were reported in the vicinity of Crowley Lake.

In the Torrance Herald-sponsored Trout Derby practically anyone who caught a fish during the first three days of the season has an excellent chance to claim one of the four coveted prizes being offered by local fishing tackle-dealers in Torrance.

Reports floating in from the mountains claim that most fishermen either caught their limits or went without a strike.

After spending a cold windy Saturday and Sunday on Crooked Creek in the High Sierras, Robert Clayton, Jack Clayton, Van Barnard and Ed Reil brought in about 75 Brown and Rainbow trout. One of them reached here to about here and which should qualify for one of the prizes donated by Joe's Sports Shop, Scotty's Sports Shop, the Torrance Hardware and Lovelady Hardware Store.

The foursome recommend to other local anglers intending to fish the same waters in the

near future, to go above Powerhouse Number 1 as construction crews are working the waters below and make for poor fishing.

Councilman WILLIS G. BLOUNT had this tale of woe to report at Crowley Lake: "We fished for 15 hours Saturday and Sunday. We used spinners, worms, salmon eggs, flies, wet and dry, and plugs, and didn't get a single—not one single strike. The weather dropped to 12 degrees and the waters near the edge of the streams froze solid enough to walk on. We had three blankets and wished we had 30."

George Fishering (that's real by his name) a chief estimator at Ideco, trotted the waters of Lake Arrowhead with a flat fish to not a fair catch.

Detective Captain Ernie Ashen, guarding the whereabouts of his favorite fishing jaunt as

jealously as the answer to a Charlie Chan "Who-Done-It," brought in a nice catch but wouldn't say where from.

JOE PRENEVOS, a walking-talking edition of "What Every Young Fisherman Should Know," relayed that most reports he had were from Jackson Lake where opening weekend fishing varied from worse to forst.

Foul weather and too many fishermen per fish resulted in mostly poor catches out of Jackson, he said.

John Salm, manufacturer of mother of pearl fishing lures, and John Walker, who is employed at the Salm Manufacturing Company, are reported to have brought in limits at Lake Arrowhead where limits were landed before 7 a.m. on opening day.

## TROUT DERBY RULES

The following rules will obtain for the Herald-sponsored Trout Derby to be run during the first three days of the 1950 trout season:

1. Participants must live in Torrance or in the Shoestring Strip.
2. Qualifying trout must have been taken during legal hours of fishing on Saturday, April 29; Sunday, April 30; or Monday, May 1.
3. Stream trout will be judged on basis of length, lake trout on the basis of weight.
4. Contestants will have until 1 p.m. Saturday, May 6, to post entries in the Herald office, 1619 Gramercy avenue or with anyone of the four participating merchants.
5. Entries may be certified by bringing the fish to the Torrance Herald office; submitting photographic proof of length, or submitting claim substantiated by the signed statements of two witnesses.
6. Contestants unable to return to Torrance in time for the May 6 deadline may submit entries by mail with the substantiating statements.
7. The contest is open to both men and women.
8. No employee of the Torrance Herald or cooperating merchants is eligible to compete.
