8150 Use Recreation Facilities During April, Survey Reveals

More than 8150 persons took advantage of the city's recreational facilities during April, according to a report released recently by Frank Carpenter, superintendent of recreation.

High on the list of areas used was the Torrance Ball park. A total of 344 youths and 461 adults actively used the park, while 1594 turned out as spectators, Carpenter reported.

Next on the list was the Walteria buildings which was used by 447 youths, 393 adults, and 506 spectators. This added up to 1346 as compared with the 2399 using the Torrance Ball park.

More than 1000 used the Fern Avenue park, 501 used the Walteria park area, 135 the Torrance Park, and lesser numbers used the Torrance Playground and the Fern Avenue building.

No reports were obtained from schools, Pueblo, North Torrance park or building, or the El Retiro Park and building. The North Torrance and El Retiro recreation buildings have not yet been completed.

Reporting on the use of the Civic Auditorium, Carpenter revealed that the Square Dance group drew 394 persons, while the Saturday evening Teen-age dances drew a total of 1152, during the month.

Torrance Area Youth and Municipal bands brought 587 into the auditorium and the Friday Teen-age nights brought 312. Reporting on special activities,

NHS GETS FIVE PLACES IN CITY TRACK PRELIMS

Narbonne's terrific trio, Jack Widman, Bob Daligney, and Mike Moore, captured five qualifying places in the city track preliminaries Saturday at the Coliseum.

Richard Dalton and John Mitchell were the Gaucho Bee qualifiers, while flyin' Frank Algarne and Kenneth Orr did likewise for the Cee carriers.

Daligney, Johnny-c-o-m-elately hurdler, proved that he learns fast by winning his heat in the lows in 20.8s. Both Daligney and Moore cleared the necessary 6 feet to place among nine city qualifiers in the high jump.

Moore couldn't better 22 feet in the broad jump as he did the previous week but his 21 ft., 9 3/4 effort was good enough to gain him a tie for sixth among ten who will compete in the finals next Friday night at the same stadium.

Widman, defending champion in the pole vault, easily scaled the essential 11 ft., 9 in. height to place among ten qualifiers, who also included his Eastern Marine league rival, Manuel Ceja, of Banning.

Mitchell, leading light of the Gaucho Bees, ran second in the first 660-yard heat by Byrd of Venice in 1m. 27s. Dalton was among eleven Bee pole vault qualifiers at 10 ft., 9 in.

Algarne, spunky little Cee sprinter, nabbed second in the first 180 heat, while his teammate Jim Orr was among 11 pole vault qualifiers at 10 feet.

Main varsity casualty of the elimination set-to for Narbonne was classy half-miler Don Headley, who failed to qualify in his specialty.
