Tenure Granted Teachers At El Camino College

Permanent positions were assured for 25 members of the faculty of El Camino College by action of the Board of Trustees at its regular bi-weekly meeting held at the college April 25. Faculty members affected are those who have been teaching at the college since its inception three years ago. Under the provisions of the Education Code, teachers elected for the fourth consecutive year automatically acquire permanency in their positions.

On recommendation of College President Forrest G. Murdock, the Board also approved the employment of 44 probationary teachers who have been instructing at the college this year and, in addition, authorized the employment of 22 additional instructors for the fall term commencing in September.

A recommendation by Murdock for the appointment of three part-time assistant directors, three part-time coordinators and five additional part-time counselors also was approved. Instructors appointed to these positions will teach half-time in addition to their administrative duties.

Other actions of the board at the meeting included:
 1. Granted leave of absence for a period of one year to Instructor Stanley Brown in order that he may complete the requirements for his doctor's degree at Stanford University.
 2. Authorized the superintendent and board members to attend the annual meeting of school trustees at Long Beach on May 6.

3. Authorized the attendance of faculty members Richard Robins and Robert Stone at an eight-week work shop study to be held at U.C.L.A. during the summer under the auspices of the State Federation of Junior Colleges as a result of a \$30,000 grant from the Carnegie Foundation for study of general education in the junior colleges of California.

4. Approved a request from Contracting Engineers Company of Los Angeles, general contractors for the construction of social science building for change in subcontractor for brick work. New subcontractor will be the Wilhelm Company of Inglewood.

5. Accepted as complete electrical distribution system to temporary buildings under contract with Lee Wilson of Los Angeles.

6. Awarded contract for the printing of college catalog to Leonard Charles and Associates of Los Angeles.
