to acquire farms and homes. It brings into operation and validates the veterans Bond Act of 1949, governing manner of issuing, selling and redeeming such bonds.

Another proposed change in

the constitution, No. 2 authorizes the Legislature, to prescribe extent of tax exemption for the farms or homes being purchased by veterans from the veterans welfare Board pursuant to contract under whose terms legal title is vested in said board.

Proposition No. 3 will, if passed, authorize cities or other public bodies to pledge parking meter income as security for payments of revenue on bonds issued to finance construction or acquisition of public parking lots, garages, or other automotive parking facilities.

Political handshakes are giving, this odds that Mayor Bob L. Haggard would continue to be mayor. It is stated that if Benstead is seated on the council, it will change the majority vote on the council.

When Mayor Haggard was nominated for mayor, two of the present council members, George Powell and Nick Dale, voted against Haggard. With Benstead on the council it is quite possible that Haggard, realizing that he no longer has a supporting vote from Councilman Blount and Harvey B. Spelman Jr., would resign—if not, the council could appoint a new mayor.

In this case the new mayor would undoubtedly be either Dale, Powell or Benstead. Just what action might take place Monday was the point of much and varied legal speculation. Attorney Isen will ask the ballots be counted at the hearing. He has subpoenaed City Clerk to be in court for the hearing, with instructions to bring with him all of the ballots and other election data pertaining to the election held on April 11, which sent Blount to the City Council.

Meanwhile Blount's attorney believes the matter to be a hearing asking Blount to show cause why there should not be a recount of the ballots, and that it is possible the actual recount would be held at another hearing.

Judge Willett Advises Study Of Court Plan

Judge Otto B. Willett, who in the past week has spoken before numerous civic, religious and fraternal organizations on the subject, today issued a statement to all citizens of the district to carefully consider the proposed plan for the reorganization of the lower courts of California.

"The proposed bill, to be voted on by all electors of the state as a constitutional amendment at the November general election, should be studied by every citizen," Judge Willett said. "It is one of the most sweeping revisions of the judicial structure of the state since California was admitted to the Union."

The amendment, Judge Willett pointed out, will abolish all courts below the municipal court, except in a few instances. He called attention to the fact that in one county of the state there are but two lawyers, one of whom is the county judge and the other is the district attorney.

Justice Willett is one of several lawyers in the district who have volunteered their services to the Judicial Council of the State to speak on the subject to inform the electors of the contents of the bill. His talks before groups in Torrance, Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach and Gardena lead him to believe the people are especially interested in the subject.

Judge Willett, candidate for the office of Justice of the Peace of Gardena Township, stated he would be willing to discuss the proposed bill with anyone interested.
