**Held Named Athlete of Year At El Camino**

Paul Held, outstanding triple-threat athlete from Redondo Beach, has been named El Camino College's "Athlete of the Year." Held was unanimously chosen by the college coaching staff and H. J. Sheffield, director of student personnel.

Presentation of the award will be made before the student body at the annual spring awards assembly today.

Held was chosen on the basis of his outstanding performances in three major sports this season: football, basketball, and baseball.

As first string quarterback, Held effectively piloted the Warrior football squad through its most successful season to date. His heads-up signal calling and sharp passing was a strong factor in making the Warriors a conference threat. The Camino eleven dropped only three games in the entire season and came within one touchdown of upsetting the Metro conference champions, East Los Angeles.

Held started the casaba season on the junior varsity, but got his chance with the varsity when George Naumann was injured. He proved a strong asset to Coach John Morrow's cagers by scoring 112 points from his forward post.

Last year Held was named to the 1949 All-Metropolitan conference baseball squad for his brilliant work at first base. This season he was switched to first string right field.
