Table Shows Effect of Recount On Councilman Blount, Benstead

The following table compiled by the Torrance Herald shows how the recount of ballots now under way in Superior Court in Los Angeles is affecting Councilman Willys G. Blount and Challenger Victor E. Benstead.

The table shows the precinct number, address and voter registration, the number of ballots originally credited to each candidate, and the votes credited to each candidate after the Superior Court recount.

Blount Leading Ballot Recount

The precinct election board as the correct count. Albert Isen, attorney for Benstead, and Nick Cucchi, wanted the ballots in broken seal envelopes discarded.

One such case would have developed with the ballot from precinct number two. Had the judge discarded the votes from this precinct Benstead would have picked up 15 votes.

The recount action was brought against Willys G. Blount, voter over Benstead in the last election by the count of 1421 to 1414.

After S. V. O. Prichard, attorney for Blount, and Attorney Isen agreed to the paved of jurists to make the new tally, Judge Mosk named six counters headed by Hammel D. Martin of Glendale.

Others selected included Mrs. Julia Meltzer, Mrs. Fern Hedge, Mrs. Margaret Wallace, and Joseph B. Ruatti, all of Los Angeles, and Robert Axtell of Manhattan Beach.

Adding by the terms in the election code Benstead was asked to post the necessary \$45 to cover the cost of the counters' salaries.

As the inspection of ballots continued it appeared that some of Benstead's strongest backers had cast him several votes. In their enthusiasm to cast their vote for Benstead, especially on single shots, several ballots had to be discarded because of mutilation.

At the end of the first day's court action on Monday Blount had increased his lead from seven to nine votes—picking up one vote each in precincts four and six.

The count as originally determined by the Torrance election board of precinct number two was accepted as the recount figure. On examination it was discovered that the seal on the envelope containing the ballots from precinct number two had been broken.

Judge Mosk ruled that since the broken seal clearly indicated that someone could have tampered with the ballots the original count would have to be accepted.

The same situation is expected to occur in regard to envelopes from other precincts. Further doubt regarding the broken-seal envelope in number two precinct was cast when it was discovered that the seal was also broken on the envelope which contained the discarded and unused ballots.

City Clerk A. H. Bartlett testified that the seals in his opinion had become broken in transit and during handling. When he volunteered the further assertion that he would "guarantee that the envelopes had not been tampered with," Judge Mosk ordered Bartlett's last statement stricken from the record explaining that since Bartlett had not had the envelopes in his possession constantly since the election two months ago, he was in no position to testify whether the envelopes had been opened accidentally or maliciously.

Earlier, Bartlett had testified that the ballots had been kept in the vault in the city hall, and that when he learned that a recount was in prospect he had had his staff "tear up the broken sealed envelopes with strings."

The city hall vault is adjacent to the swinging door of the public counter in the city clerk's office. Actual counting of the ballots is being done in room 1118 in the Hall of Records.

The counting began after Judge Mosk heard legal arguments from both attorneys on the question of whether or not a recount was legal.

The judge denied a motion by Attorney Prichard that the demand for a recount be set aside. Prichard maintained that Isen had failed to stipulate any specific irregularities or illegal actions as having taken place during the April 11 voting. He said he was thus unable to defend his client. Isen maintained that the only manner in which he would be able to prove that errors were made in the counting would be to actually recount the ballots.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Education of the Torrance Unified School District of Los Angeles County will receive bids for furnishing materials, labor and services necessary to paint the exterior of the Permanent Building and the interior of the Permanent School located at 2200 Carson Street.

Each bid must be submitted on a form furnished by the Board of Education, must be sealed and opened in public at 10 a.m. and will be opened in public at that time and will be sealed and accompanied by a certificate of check for not less than 5% of the total amount of the bid.

The above mentioned check shall be given as a guarantee that the bidder will enter into contract if awarded the work or any part thereof and will be declared forfeited if the successful bidder refuses to enter into contract after being requested to do so by the Owner.

In accordance with the Labor Code of the State of California, the general prevailing rate of wages shall be paid for each craft or type of workman needed to execute the contract.

These prevailing rates as contained in the specifications are as follows: Laborers-General \$1.57 Painters-Brush 2.00 Painters-Spray 2.25 Plasterers-Tender 1.85

Apprentices shall not be paid less than 17 1/2 cents per hour more than the hourly rate of the highest classification of workman he has supervision as to the basic trade, and not less than 24 cents per hour as to the sub-trade more than the journeyman rate for the craft involved.

Over-time: One and one-half (1 1/2) times the above rate. Sundays and Holidays: One and one-half (1 1/2) times the above rate. Duplication shall be mandatory upon the contractor to whom the contract is awarded and upon all sub-contractors under hire to pay not less than the prevailing wage scale in accordance with the provisions of Section 1770 of the Labor Code to all workmen employed in the execution of this contract.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a Labor and Material Bond in the amount equal to 50% of the contract price and a Faithful Performance Bond in an amount equal to 50% of the contract price. Said bonds shall be secured from surety companies satisfactory to the Owner.

The Owner reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive more than one bid and to determine the lowest responsible bidder. No bidder may withdraw his bid or be bound to execute a contract for a period of thirty (30) days after the date set for the opening thereof.
