

# Summer To Arrive At Parks On June 19

Torrance playgrounds will officially open for a full program of summer activities on Monday, June 19, according to an announcement yesterday by Frank H. Carpenter, superintendent of recreation.

Final details for the summer program will be ironed out in a clinic and workshop by the summer staff on June 12.

A complete summer staff has been assigned, and every recreational minded boy and girl will find plenty to keep them busy all summer, Carpenter promised.

An illustrated summer program booklet will be available on the opening day, June 19, Carpenter said. Homes in the city will be visited by the various directors, he said, and residents will be invited to use the facilities available.

Teen-age activities will be stressed at each area on one night of the week. Wednesdays will be Play Day for all teenage girls in the high school area each week. Archery, golf, tennis, volleyball, badminton, driving school and many other activities will be offered. Girls can register for these activities on Wednesday, June 21.

An eight-team girls' softball league is being planned, also, to play with the Lomita Recreation center. This league should be ready to start play soon after the summer program starts, according to Carpenter.


