## Permit Totals Nearing Record

Building permits issued in Torrance during the first five months of 1950 add up to \$3,725,270 more than the total for the first five months of 1949, according to figures released last week by James Dresser, the city's building inspector.

Total permit valuations of \$588,097 for May of this year bring the 1950 total to \$5,680,009, Dresser said.

This compares to the total of \$1,954,739 at this time last year. Last year's total was only slightly short of the record year of 1948, Dresser said.

Commenting on the figures, City Manager George Stevens said the month of June should be another high one, based on the approval of tracts during recent weeks.

Eighty-one new dwelling units were constructed in the city during May, the figures reveal.

Basing an estimate on the fairly accurate figure of three persons for each dwelling, the local Chamber of Commerce puts the population of the city at 24,210, as of May 31.

The Chamber figures have proved very accurate in the past, according to Mrs. Bertha Hedberg, who totes up the estimates.

Meanwhile, City Manager Stevens is holding to his earlier prediction that the city will reach the \$10 million mark in permits this year.

The city has seven months to pick up an additional \$4,319,991 and make Stevens an accurate predictor.

### Salvation Army Needs Playpens, Cribs, Chairs

Hundreds of children in needy homes are without furniture necessary to their well-being and happiness, Brigadier Fred Ohn, manager of the Salvation Army social service center serving this area, said today. He said that numerous requests to the center for cribs, playpens, bassinets, and highchairs have accumulated due to the lack of such items.

Brig. Ohn appealed to families whose baby furniture no longer is in use to donate it to the needy children. He said that a telephone call to Torrance 1563 would bring a Red Shield truck to the donors' homes to pick up the furniture.

Need for playpens was pointed out by Brig. Ohn. Due to the high unemployment rate, many expectant parents are unable to provide clothing for their future family.

The Salvation Army social service center acts as a clearing house for welfare work among the needy and handicapped, Brig. Ohn said. All types of castoff materials donated by the public are refinished in the center workshops, furnishing employment and materials with which to assist the destitute. He asked housewives and businessmen to telephone for a Red Shield truck whenever discarded articles collect around the home or office.
