

### Police Chief Promotes Seven TAPs

Based on recent examinations, seven members of the Torrance Auxiliary Police were promoted by Police Chief John Stroth at the last meeting of the youth group in the City Hall.  
 Announced last week were the following appointments:

In the official canvass of the June 6 primary election, incumbent John Schilder defeated Municipal Judge Otto B. Willett, 14,999 to 8,552, for the office of Justice of the Peace of the Gardena Township, it was revealed this week.  
 Other official canvass results were:  
 Director of the West Basin Municipal Water District: William C. Farquhar, unopposed, 2,368.  
 17th Congressional District—Democratic: Cecil King, 70,768; Charles Wilson, 13,489; Republican—King, 24,437; Wilson, 20,380.  
 King received 99 write-in votes on the Independent Progressive Party ticket and 15 votes on the Prohibition ticket. Wilson received 10 prohibition votes.
