

## NORTH TORRANCE GROUP TO AIR DUST PROBLEMS

Dear Sir:

Something happened today in Torrance I think should be published for the sake of humanity and justice.

Today I went to the city hall in Torrance to see about getting a permit to sell fireworks for the Fourth of July.

I spoke to Miss June as to what the requirements were. She got the typewritten paper to see what the requirements were. She read that permits were being issued only to veteran's administration or to church groups.

Not being satisfied with this statement, I went into the engineer's office to ask to see Mr. Stevens, the city manager. I was told by his secretary that Mr. Stevens wasn't in. Could she help me? I explained I was denied a permit to sell fireworks because I was not a veteran or because I did not go to church (which I do).

She rang the Chief of Police, who asked who wanted the permit. She said it was the Wateria Plumbing and Hardware. They said: "No, he could not buy a permit."

Now if I were willing to pay \$50 for the permit, for four days just to sell fireworks, why couldn't I buy it? Others could. Isn't it just as legal for me to sell fireworks as a veteran or churchman if I were willing to pay the \$50? And Lord knows \$50 is too high.

I am not finding fault with the city employees, but don't you think these politicians are going too far when they say who can and who can't buy a permit?

I remember when I was a small boy, in World War I, my relatives told me they were going to war so we kids would have an equal right.

In World War II we were told we were fighting a war for Freedom and now, no doubt, we are going to be in World War III so all people shall have equal freedom.

Torrance is in California and California is in the United States. Doesn't it say in the Constitution of the United States that all men shall have an equal right?

Then why was I denied a permit and others not? I don't think any man or group of men should get so powerful as to say who can and who can't make a living where the public is involved.

We carry two business licenses (one for residence) which I don't think is constitutional. We are not doing anything against the law. Then why were we denied a permit to sell fireworks?

I think the Torrance Herald and other newspapers in the United States would do very well to publish the Constitution of our country so some people might read it. It might be a better place for all.
