'Personality Plus' Series Will Be Launched Tonight

Miss Virginia Barnelle, well-known speaker on charm and personality, is leading off the 1950 Personality Plus series this evening at 7:15 in the Central Guild hall, corner of Marcelina and Arlington avenues. Miss Emma Carstens will preside over the opening session.

Miss Barnelle participated in the 1949 series, and girls who heard her have requested a return engagement. She has had a great deal of experience in the "glamour" business, having made her debut as an actress at the age of 2, on a showboat. She has played in everything from tent shows to Broadway productions, her latest engagement having been "Last Stop" at the Barrymore Theater in New York. She spent a year working in the movies, and 't was then, she says, that she learned the secrets of the glamorizing business. During the war years she presented her courses on charm and beauty to about 5000 women and girls in YWCAs, USO units and factories in the New York area. Since coming to Los Angeles she has presented her course at most of the YWCAs, has worked on radio programs and has worked on a degree in Theatre arts at UCLA.
