An urgent appeal for women to serve as Red Cross Gray Ladies at Harbor General Hospital in Torrance, was issued today by Mrs. F. S. Haynes, chairman of the Gray Ladies Service for Los Angeles Red Cross Chapter.

Women are needed to staff the tuberculosis wards of the hospital, and women interested in serving in this phase of the Red Cross program should call the Harbor District office, Terminal 2-8321 for appointment interview.

"The need for Red Cross Gray Ladies in these wards has reached an acute stage," Mrs. Haynes pointed out. "Patients here, unlike those in veteran administration hospitals, do not have the advantage of visits and other services performed by representatives of veteran auxiliaries and other units, and consequently are quite alone. Gray Ladies not only visit with these patients, but perform extra curricular activities such as writing letters and carrying out shopping errands for them."




