### Hearings Slated For Hollywood Parkway Dispute

Public hearings on the problem of the Hollywood-Palos Verdes Parkway in Hollywood Riviera will be held beginning at 8 p.m. August 2 in the City Council Chambers, according to an announcement by Earle A. Lloyd, secretary of the Torrance Planning Commission. Origin of the problem was the abandonment of 105 feet on the westerly side of the parkway, the land so vacated being given to the adjoining property owners. These owners, the Huntington-Redondo Company and the Sunhaven Corporation, say they cannot use the land because of a ruling by the city attorney that the vacated property may be used only for street purposes. This unpaired strip of land constitutes a barrier to the use of the adjoining properties, the companies claim, in asking for a change of the zoning there.



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
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
