TORRANCE HERALD COUNTY IMPROVEMENT NO. 1368 FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF SANITARY SEWERS AND APPURTENANCES

DOLORES STREET AND OTHER RIGHTS OF WAY RESOLUTION OF INTENTION WHEREAS the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, has on file and spread upon the minutes of said Board a report from the Health Officer of said County recommending the institution of proceedings for the improvement as a health measure, and

WHEREAS said Board of Supervisors has found and determined by resolution that the public convenience and necessity require the construction of sanitary sewers in Dolores Street and other rights of way and that such project is necessary as a health measure;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, as follows: SECTION 1. That the public interest and convenience require and that it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, to cause the following work to be done and improvement made, to-wit:

First: The construction of sanitary sewers in DOLORES STREET between the northern line of CARSON STREET and a point approximately 135 feet north of the northern line of 220TH STREET.

Second: The widening of the trench in the streets and rights of way wherein aforementioned sanitary sewers are constructed.

All of said work shall be performed in the streets and between the lines heretofore designated, except where the plans indicate that said work shall be otherwise situated.

THAT SUCH WORK OR IMPROVEMENTS TO BE PERFORMED WILL COST THE SUM OF SIX THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$6,400).

SECTION 2. That all the work and improvements aforesaid shall be done and performed as shown on and in accordance with and to the general specifications shown on the plans, profiles and specifications therefor, filed in the office of the Board of Supervisors in the Hall of Records in the City of Los Angeles on the 26th day of July, 1950. Reference is hereby made to said plans, profiles and specifications for a full and complete description of said proposed work or improvement and for the description of the grade to which this work is to be done, and are made a part hereof.

SECTION 3. That the said contemplated work or improvement, in the opinion of said Board of Supervisors, is more than local or ordinary public benefit, and said Board of Supervisors hereby makes the expense of said improvement chargeable upon a district which district said Board of Supervisors hereby declares to be the district benefited by said work or improvement and for the assessment thereon the cost and expense thereof.

A map of said district, indicating by a boundary line the extent of the territory included in the proposed improvement, approved by said Board of Supervisors on the 26th day of July, 1950, is on file in the office of said Board. Reference is hereby made to said map for a full and complete description of said district and said map shall govern for all details as to the extent of said assessment district.

SECTION 4. That said bonds shall be issued to represent each assessment of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) or more remaining unpaid for said work after the date of the recording of the warrant. Said bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from the second day of January next succeeding the date of the fifteenth following their date, and an even annual proportion thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year thereafter until the whole amount shall be paid, and interest shall be payable semiannually by coupon on the second days of January and July, and until the whole amount on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal and interest is paid.

Said bonds shall be issued in accordance with the Act of the Legislature of the State of California, designated and known as Division 7 of the Streets and Highways Code (Improvement Act of 1911).

SECTION 5. That the proceedings for the aforesaid work or improvement shall be had and taken under and in accordance with an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, designated and known as Division 4 of the Streets and Highways Code (Improvement Act No. 4348 (New Series) providing that all payments made within 30 days from the recording thereof shall be made to county Supervisor.

SECTION 6. The Streets heretofore referred to are public streets in the County of Los Angeles, and are located in unincorporated territory in the vicinity of Elysian.

SECTION 7. That it is the opinion of the Board of Supervisors that the public interest will not be served and that the property owners to be done under these proceedings for the work to be done under these proceedings.

SECTION 8. That on the 22nd day of August, 1950, at the hour of ten o'clock A. M. of said day, is the day and hour, and the Chamber of Commerce of Supervisors in the Hall of Records in the City of Los Angeles, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, hereby adopted the following resolution:

That the County Engineer shall cause to be conspicuously posted along the line of said contemplated work or improvement, and along all open streets within the district liable to be assessed, notices in the manner and to the form required by law.

SECTION 9. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall cause to be adopted in accordance with the provisions of Section 1770 of the Labor Code to all contractors who are to be employed in the execution of this contract.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a Labor and Material Bond in the amount equal to 50% of the contract price and a Faithful Performance Bond in an amount equal to 50% of the contract price. Said bonds shall be secured from surety companies satisfactory to the Owner.

The Owner reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive the right to do so, and to determine the lowest responsible bid. No bidder may withdraw his bid, check or bid, until the date set for the opening of bids.

40,000 Plus Use City's Recreation Areas in July

More than 40,000 persons took advantage of the recreation facilities offered in Torrance during the month of July, according to figures released yesterday by the Recreation Department. Leading in the number of persons using the city areas was Torrance playground with an estimated 8100 persons visiting the grounds during the month.

Walteria Park was second, according to the department, with a total attendance of about 7300. Perry Playground listed 5750 visitors, while the Torrance ball park was credited with a total of 4200.

Other playgrounds listed included Torrance Park, El Retiro Park, Seaside Playground, Fern Park and the Civic Auditorium.

Teen-age youths accounted for the largest attendance in the auditorium, the figures showed, with a total of 803 being credited with participating in the canteen program.

Other activities in the auditorium included square dances, golf classes and the gymnastics class.

Expanded Radio, TV Training Planned For El Camino College

Expansion of El Camino College's radio and television instruction program is planned for the fall semester with the addition of a second full-time instructor in the department, according to Dr. Lyle Tussing, director of instruction.

In addition to William W. Wyllie, who has been teaching radio and television maintenance and repair during the past year, Karl H. Stello will serve as instructor beginning in September.

With the opening of the regular semester, day students will find available all classes required for the two-year radio technician's course leading to an Associate of Arts degree. Completion of the course will prepare students for a wide variety of jobs in radio and television operation, maintenance and repair.

Positions for which students are trained include maintenance and technical operators in police, aeronautical and commercial ground station work; vacuum tube manufacturing, radio receiver and transmitter design and construction, sound technicians, and sales and service work in radio merchandising firms.

Three night classes will be offered at the college for those interested in amateur radio and for those who want to learn radio and television maintenance and repair. A new offering is the course in radio code and license preparation, designed to prepare students for the U. S. government radio operator's license examination.
