Community-Like Lights To Brighten El Camino

El Camino College is to be lit up, not like a church, but like a full-grown institution of higher learning as a result of action of the Board of Trustees meeting in regular session at the college last Tuesday.

Installation of a complete street lighting system along the college campus on Redondo Beach, Crenshaw, and Manhattan Beach boulevards, with a similar type lighting for the interior areas, was approved by the board in awarding a contract for construction in the amount of \$41,432.00 to the C. D. Draucker Company of Los Angeles. Work on the lighting contract is to be commenced immediately with completion scheduled by the beginning of the fall semester on September 11. Specifications call for the installation of the latest type Sodium Vapor lights on Marbleite standards.

INSTRUCTORS HIRED

In other actions the board approved the following items: 1. Elected the following new instructors for the fall semester: John W. Houston as an instructor in Mathematics and English. Houston has a Masters degree from the University of Montana and has done graduate work at Yale University and U.C.L.A. William E. Hartman, sociology and psychology. Hartman has a Doctors degree at U.S.C. Delmas A. Buggelli to teach economic geography and social studies. Buggelli has previously taught at Columbia University and the Florida State College. He has recently been connected with the U. S. Army and the United Nations Relief Agency in Europe.

Robert K. Neary to teach economics. Neary is presently teaching at Compton College. He has a Masters degree from the University of California and has done advance work at Stanford University.

Science Theme Sunday — 'Soul'
