




Rites Conducted For Wife of Columbia Worker



Mother of Army Man Declares Rumors Untrue

... Hall, Hearty, and Alive - Rumors that Ralph Standridge, 18, former Torrance High School football star, was "missing in action in Korea" were declared untrue this week by his mother, Mrs. Ruth Standridge, 1214 Beech avenue.

"In fact," said Mrs. Standridge, "he isn't even in Korea." The ex-Tartar Varsity end is now with the Military Police in Tokyo.

His mother could give no explanation as how the rumors, ranging from "wounded" to "killed in action," started.

She said she had received a letter from her son last week in which he said it was doubtful that M.P.'s would be sent to Korea.

Pr. Standridge played with the 1948 Varsity. He joined the Army in August of last year.

New Bank Construction Under Way in Lomita


Construction of new and larger quarters for California Bank's Lomita Office is under way at 2173 West Lomita boulevard.
