Law and Order Squad Walks Away with Game

Combining a single with five walks, the Torrance Police nine came from behind after two men were out in the last of the ninth inning to hand a 9-8 defeat to the Dedaux Trojans at the local ball factory Sunday afternoon.

Playing tight ball behind the pitching of Moose Bennett, the local club led all the way until the top of the ninth when the Trojans worked Bennett for a double and three walks to score two runs and take on an 8 to 6 lead in the game.

Two of the boys in blue tapped the pellet over the wall earlier of the pitching of Trojan Maynard Horst. Gordie Buchanan, who was catching, unloaded one in the third inning. Manager Swayne Johnson, holding down the keystone sack, lifted one out of the park in the seventh.

Bennett, who did the pitching for the club Sunday, did a remarkable job, considering that he is the regular catcher. (Actually, no aibis are needed). He struck out nine and allowed only eight hits, going all the way.

Jerry McIlvaine, regular pitcher for the law and order squad,

pitched in the semi-pro tournament at Sawtelle Friday night and had another game coming up this week, so was saving his arm, Johnson said.

McIlvaine, Johnson and Bennett are playing in the Sawtelle tournament with the Los Angeles Senators, a squad that beat the Police last week.

The last-inning rally to win the game for the police started after two men were out. Vic Ordaz, Jim Nady and Don Fulton walked to fill the bases. Bennett got a scratch single to score Ordaz and Nady to tie the game, and Bucky Kuhn walked to fill the bases again.

With the pressure really on, the Trojan chucker walked Hank Camou forcing in Fulton to end the game.

Bennett's single — which cost the club a broken bat — was his third of the day. He went hitless in two games last Sunday, but made up by getting three for four and a walk this week.

Sportsman's Calendar

The Division of Fish and Game reminds California sportsmen of the following general regulations which apply to current hunting and fishing.

Deer—Ends September 15 in central and south coastal areas. Bag limit: two bucks. September 16 to October 15 in Sierra, north coastal, and Modoc-Lassen areas. Bag limit: two bucks in north coastal area; one buck elsewhere; no forked horns in northeastern California section.

Brush and Cottontail Rabbits—September 1 to December 31 in Districts 4, 4½, and 4¾; November 18 to December 15 in District 13½; November 18 to December 31 in balance of State. Bag and possession limits: four per day.

Jack Rabbits—September 1 to December 31 in Southern California Districts 4, 4½, 4¾, 19, 20, and 22. No closed season elsewhere. No bag limit.

Sage Hens—September 1 and September 2, in Mono County only. Bag limit: two per season.

Doves—September 1 to September 30. White-wings in Imperial County September 1 to September 15. Bag and possession limits: 10 per day. Shooting hours: Noon to sunset on opening day; one-half hour before sunrise to sunset otherwise.

Trout—Ends October 31. Bag limit: 15 trout, salmon or Rocky Mountain whitefish, but not more than 10 pounds and one fish. Local exceptions.

Black Bass, Sunfish, Crappie, Sacramento Perch—Ends February 28 in northern California. No closed season elsewhere. Bag limits: 5 black bass, 25 sunfish, crappie, perch. Local exceptions. No size limits.

Striped Bass—No closed season. Bag limit: 5 fish or 25 pounds and one fish, or 2 fish regardless of weight. Minimum size limit: 12 inches.

Ocean Fish—No closed season on the following species (bag limit included): 15 rockfish; 2 marlin; 2 black sea bass; 3 salmon; 2 broadbill swordfish; 10 tuna, croaker, skipjack, albacore, barracuda, yellowtail, white sea bass, bonito, rock bass, kelp bass, corbina, halibut, ling cod and cabezone. No limit other species.

Clams—Opens September 1 in Humboldt and Monterey Bay areas. No closed season elsewhere. Bag limits: 30 razor; 10 big neck; 10 Pismo; 10 Washington. No limit on jack knife clams.

Cockles—September 1 to April 30 in counties north of San Luis Obispo County. No closed season elsewhere. Bag limit: 50. Minimum size limit: one and one-half inches in diameter.
