


Tartars Launch 1950 Grid Season

Coaches Rex Welch and Cliff Graybehl looked pleased as they sized up the growth some of the lads put on during the summer months.

The Tartar coaches looked especially pleased when 12 varsity lettermen showed up. Included here were ends Cal Browning, Tom Pryor and Beryl Jones; linemen Bill Bourne, Dick Ferguson, Jim Leece, and Jim Dunmeyer; center Ted Marconi; and backs Jim Smith, Joe Cleveland, Jack Faren and Aramis Dandoy.

Also expected to show up some time this week is letterman Glynn Boyce, a back. Boyce was in the mountains on vacation when the Sept. 1 practice opened, according to one of the coaches.

Many good men are moving up from the Bees this year to supplement the varsity. Among these are Bill Gray, Johnny Spiller, Dick Armend, Bill Koehn, Jim Murphy, Bill Crawford and Gary Groves.

Great things are predicted for Groves—he's a first-rate tackle and will give some of the old timers a run for their starting berths.

While varsity gridders are doing push-ups and bicycles on one end of the field, Coach Vernon Wolfe is putting about 60 Bees through their paces on the other end.

So far none of the local mentors has brought out the crying towel about the fall prospects—this is strictly an unhealthy atmosphere, because a coach is just naturally supposed to say he doesn't have a chance to win a game.

Everything is new around here now, however. We'll wait a couple of weeks.

New Tartar Bee Coach Played for Gardena High

Blond, 28-year-old Vernon R. Wolfe dropped in the other day (at our suggestion), and held a 20-minute press conference in the Herald City Room.

We'd like to predict right now that sports fans around Torrance will hear a lot of Wolfe

—he's the new Bee Grid coach at Torrance High and will be a stablemate to Varsity Coaches Cliff Graybehl and Rex Welch.

A likeable young man with a rosy smile, Wolfe comes to Torrance from Gardena, where he was coach last year at the Spanish-American Institute. While there he coached basketball, track, baseball and football.

Many Torrance men have already met up with the new Bee mentor. He played halfback with Gardena High before the war when both Gardena and Torrance were in the Marine League. He played on the Bee squad in 1937, and on the varsity in 1938 and 1939.

Entering the University of Southern California in 1940, he completed two years there before going into the paratroopers in the spring of 1943. He spent three years with the jumpers before returning to SC in the spring of 1946.

While at SC after the war, he specialized in track, pole vaulting to be specific. Leading Trojan vaulter in '46 and '47, Wolfe has one 14-foot-plus vault to his credit with the Men of Troy.

Married two years ago, he and his wife Marilyn now live in Gardena where his father is a contractor. Wolfe has been spending part of the summer helping his father, he said.

He will probably coach baseball here in the spring, according to Principal John Steubach, but beyond the task of coaching the Bee gridgers, Wolfe hasn't been given definite assignments yet.
