Building Permits Continue to Rise To New Heights

Torrance building figures continued to zoom over the all-time high this month as a building total for August pushed the total for 1950 to a staggering \$8,497,374. Two large batches of permits pushed the August total up to \$665,625. Ben Haggott, Seaside Ranchos developer, received permits for 40 homes and 18 garages; and K. Sande Senness received permits to build 18 homes and 8 garages in Pacific Hills. The Haggott permits totaled \$239,700; the Senness permits totaled \$87,200. The eight-month total of \$8,497,374 represents a gain of \$5,080,612 over the total for the same period last year.

A total of 1828 permits were issued through the Torrance office as of August 30 this year, while only 759 were issued in the same period last year. City officials are more confident than ever now that earlier predictions of "10 to 12 million in permits" this year would be fulfilled.
