Labor Market Improving in Some Brackets

While placement of skilled, semi-skilled, general labor, and sales workers increased during the past month, a slight increase in the number of unemployed in the professional, clerical, and service workers, was noted during September, according to Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance office of the Department of Employment. A monthly news letter published recently by the local office, indicated that 633 residents of the Greater Torrance area were unemployed. Of that number, 330 were women, 303 were men. Of the unemployed men, 31 per cent are veterans.
