Bee Gridman Breaks Leg in Practice Scrum

First major casualty of the 1950 grid season here came last Friday afternoon when Vladimir "Laddy" Popovich, Tartar sophomore on Coach Vernon Wolfe's Bee squad, suffered a fractured leg bone at the right knee and torn ligaments in a practice scrimmage.

Coach Wolfe said this week that he didn't see the tackle which put Laddy out for the season. Laddy told the coach that he didn't know just when the injury occurred.

"All I know is I couldn't get up after being tackled," he was quoted by Wolfe.

Standing 5 feet 10 inches and weighing about 165, Popovich was slated for a spot on the team, Wolfe said. He was one of the longest punters on the field.

The injured gridman is now at Torrance Memorial Hospital where attending doctors are waiting for the leg swelling to go down before putting his leg in a cast, according to the boy's mother.

GUY DeWITT RETURNS TO NAVY DUTY


Returning to duty with the Navy recently was Guy W. DeWitt of 23804 Huber avenue, a driver for the Torrance Laundry.


Graduated from Torrance High in 1942, DeWitt played basketball, football, and was on the Tartar track team while there.
