The scrappy Commie expositors called upon the service clubs and service organizations in Torrance to do the job.  
"There is no magic formulae which can be given for fighting the Reds," Gibbons said. "It is a long, hard job requiring team work; the education of leaders and the publication of facts."

He said the Reds can be beat in this country and pointed to the recent purge of Communist-controlled unions which have been ousted by the CIO.

"The U. S. is ripe for a Red, the first step leading toward gaining control of the government by revolution is to form a strong party—the U. S. Reds have.
