When she did, she organized a company for founding a college for women in her native state, Connecticut College was the result, and Miss Wright had the satisfaction of serving that institution for thirty years as secretary and registrar, and later as bursar and assistant treasurer.

Retired in '43, she has since built a home on the college campus in New London, where she lives with her sister, Miss Mary Wright.

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
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
