

Suicide Motive Still Mystery

Motive for the suicide of Stanley M. Booth, 49, well known former Lomita resident, remained a mystery this week after officials of Chandler's Palms Verdes Sand and Gravel company said that Booth had not lost his job with the company prior to his death as was reported.

John Robertson, gravel firm official, said that Booth, a truck driver, had been working there for 4 1/2 years and was an employe in good standing before he took his life with a gun last week at WALTERIA.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the Stone and Myers mortuary in Torrance.

Last rites for the deceased were conducted Friday afternoon in the Stone and Myers chapel, with the Church of the Latter Day Saints in charge of the services. Interment was in Inglewood Park cemetery. Other than his wife, Rozell, survivors include Betty M. Proctor, a daughter, of Long Beach; Henry E. Booth, a brother in Arcadia; Margaret Jon, a sister living in Inglewood; and another brother, Earl A. Booth, of Riviera, Calif.

Retired Rail Worker Dies

The body of Charles Kimmel, 69, of 624 Madrid avenue, was shipped to Chesterton, Indiana this week, where final services will be held.

A retired employe of the Elgin, Joliet & Eastern Railroad, Kimmel died here last Sunday. He had lived in Torrance for five months after working for the railroad for 49 years.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Henrietta Kimmel, and a son, Edward, both of the Madrid avenue address. Also surviving is one daughter, Mrs. Hazel Williams, of 1307 Arlington avenue.

Besides his family here, one sister and three brothers are now living in the east.

Arrangements here were made by Stone and Myers Mortuary.


College Student Body Head Named

Civic Groups To Receive Tax Warning

Letters urging the defeat of Proposition No. 1 on the November 7 ballot, have been sent to seven civic organizations in the city this week by the City Manager's office.

George W. Stevens, city manager, acting on the recommendation of the City Council warned the organizations that if the proposition carried on the ballot the home owners in the city would be forced to carry an increased tax load.

"... defeat this irresponsible proposition, which would hamper the continuance of adequate educational facilities and city and county service," Stevens wrote.

Jury Frees Man After 3-Minute Deliberation

A nine-woman, three-man jury deliberated three minutes last Tuesday in Judge Otto B. Willett's court to find a Los Angeles insurance salesman not guilty of a child molesting charge.

Freed of the charge was Frank Frederick Helde, Jr., who was accused of committing the crime on August 3 on the Torrance Beach in the Hollywood Riviera area.

Bronson C. Buxton, local realtor and former city councilman, as foreman of the jury reported the verdict was reached on the first ballot. The jury panel included Elvera D'Onofrio, Henry Grubb, Mrs. Ruth F. Rogers, Mrs. Angus McVicar, Mrs. Cora B. Bohrer, Mrs. Winifred P. Hines, Mrs. Doris E. Hakanson, Gerald L. Alter, Mrs. Vernita Brown, Miss Katie Ortman, and Mrs. Velora Murphy.

Tom McNary, 6304 Reese Road, Seaside Ranchos, a deputy district attorney, prosecuted the case in absence of City Attorney C. Douglass Smith who is ill.

Helde was defended by Lowell L. Dryden of Los Angeles.
