More Than 200 Torrance YMCA Youth Expected to Attend Fete

Saturday, Oct. 21, will be the 18th annual "Y" day in Hollywood, and more than 200 youngsters from the Torrance area will trek to the film and radio capital to attend the largest single Y event in the world.

Applications are now being taken for Torrance youth to make the trip, it was announced yesterday by Milton Isbell, secretary of the Torrance YMCA. Boys may sign up at the YMCA office at 1339 Post avenue.

More than 7000 young men from California and Arizona are expected to attend the variety show in the morning in Hollywood Bowl. Following the program in the Bowl, the boys will be given a box lunch, then taken to the Coliseum for the UCLA-Stanford football game.

Among the stars slated to appear at the variety show Saturday morning are Art Linkletter—who will emcee the show—Edgar Bergen, Roy Rogers, Ronald Reagan, Peggy Lee, Alan Young, Dennis Day, and others. The show will be broadcast coast-to-coast by the Mutual broadcasting system.

Early reservations are necessary to enable the YMCA to arrange sufficient transportation, Isbell said. Last year, more than 100 boys made the trip from here, and Isbell said there should be more than 200 this year.

GP Construction Engineer Named To Build Plant

E. E. Boudinot, veteran construction engineer for General Petroleum Corporation, Los Angeles, has been selected to supervise the construction of a new \$30,000,000 oil refinery to be built by the Vacuum Oil Co., Ltd., in Coryton, England.

Both General Petroleum and the Vacuum Oil Co., Ltd., are affiliates of Socony-Vacuum Oil Co., Inc.

Boudinot, who is now in England, is accompanied by his wife. They have closed their Newport Beach, Calif., home and, while in England, will live in South End, a resort southeast of London. The project will take about 30 months to complete. With General Petroleum since 1917, Boudinot has played an important role in the construction and growth of General Petroleum's modern refinery here. The new Coryton refinery will treat Middle East crude oil primarily and will have a capacity of approximately 20,000 barrels of crude oil daily. It will specialize in the production of high grade lubricating oils. It is expected that the new refinery will aid Britain's efforts to reduce its dollar deficit.

Drive Under Way to Get Furniture for Dayrooms


