**Life-Saving Device Seldom Gets Full Credit in News Columns**

"Efforts of firemen using a resuscitator failed to revive the victim."  
How often have you read those words in the news columns of this and other newspapers? Quite often, we would imagine.

It is perhaps unfortunate for fire departments, and that includes the Torrance fire department, that it is considered more newsworthy when a man dies of carbon monoxide poisoning, or when a child suffocates in his crib, or when a heart attack claims the life of an elderly woman. For it is then that the cryptic words above find their way into the news columns.

**ONE FOR TEN**  
But for each such story there are perhaps another ten about the successful efforts and remarkable ability of a mechanical breathing device to revive victims who have stopped breathing. It is a simple story: the victim merely starts breathing again and goes on living, and consequently the story seldom finds its way into print.

The fact that the resuscitator is associated only with cases in which the victim has died, has caused some "loss of faith" in the use of the resuscitator as a truly lifesaving device.  
To mark Fire Prevention Month, the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce has teamed with the Torrance Fire Department to help alert the public to the job of saving lives accomplished by the local fire department. Never has a person been billed for services rendered.

**MISCONCEPTION**  
Most persons believe that the resuscitator is maintained by the fire department solely to revive smoke victims. Such is not entirely true. The use of the oxygen equipment is invaluable in the treatment of electrical shock, heart attack, drowning, gas poisoning and many other instances where for any reason a victim has stopped breathing.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Fire Department wish to impress the public with the necessity of quick action when a person has been subjected to an injury or an illness which has interfered with the normal breathing process.
